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Salem announces cancellation of two community events: Lord's Acre Festival and CROP Walk

alem is disheartened to announce the cancellation of two major community events, the annual Lord's Acre Festival and the Wolfsville-Myersville CROP Walk for Hunger.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues, with government-mandated safety protocols in place, forcing organizations everywhere to review and determine if their event is feasible.

This year's Lord's Acre Festival, which was scheduled for the second Saturday in September, would have been Salem's 61st annual event. It is the first cancellation in 61 years.

Over the years, the event has withstood tropical storm downpours, extreme heat, and many other minor calamities, but the health risk from the coronavirus has forced the cancellation.

Likewise, the Wolfsville-Myersville CROP Walk for Hunger, scheduled for late September has also been cancelled due to COVID-19. This event has been held in Wolfsville for more than 32 years.

Both, Lord's Acre and the CROP Walk are events where the community comes together, once a year, to help raise money for the church's ministry and for local and worldwide outreach needs.

Salem Church Council Decision

Salem's pastor, Bob Snyder, made the cancellation announcement on July 17, 2020, saying, "These were difficult decisions [for church council] and it saddened us to have to make them, but we felt it was the responsible thing to do.

"Many things factored into the decision, including social distancing and masks as we prepare for and do the events, availability of the Ruritan Park, ability to obtain a permit from the health department, and willingness of enough people to help.



The 2020 Lord's Acre Festival will not be held this year due to COVID-19. It's the first cancellation in 61 years. We look forward to welcoming you back in September 2021.

"The decision is in line with numerous cancellations of similar events in our area."

Outdoor Music Event

In addition to the cancellations, Pastor Bob also announced the following:

"Our hope is to hold an event on or about the date we would have held Lord's Acre, when we can bring our own lawn chairs, gather on the grass behind the church, enjoy the music of the "Works in Progress" praise band playing from the pavilion, and perhaps enjoy an ice cream treat." [A date and time will be announced soon.]

"Let us not become weary in doing good" Paul tells us in Galatians. There are struggles and challenges, but know that God is with you and that you are just where God wants you to be. Do not grow weary or lose heart. God is still good! Praying for you all this week (and month) as you continue to serve the Lord in such a time as this. Grace and Peace, — John"

August 2 "Jesus is the Great Multiplier" Matthew 14:13-21

Matthew 14:17 – "'We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish,' they answered."

There were well over five thousand people gathered to hear Jesus preach, perhaps more like ten to twenty thousand. The exact number isn't important, only that it was a huge crowd of people all assembled in one place. The disciples appealed to Jesus, "Send them away to get food." Jesus

responded, "You feed them." All the food they could come up with was a mere five loaves and two fish, a ridiculous portion to feed so many. But Jesus took what they offered and fed everyone, even having food left over. Jesus calls us to be disciples. He takes our efforts and multiplies them into something more than we could ever have imagined.

August 9 "Take Courage!" Matthew 14:22-27

Matthew 14:27 - "But Jesus immediately said to them: 'Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid."

A person is afraid to change careers because of security. A person is afraid to leave an abusive relationship because they fear the unknown more. A person is afraid to surrender a sin to God because they feel they can't live without it.

In today's reading from Matthew 14, Jesus tells the disciples to cross the lake and they cried out in fear. They had been in a storm and now they mistook Jesus for a ghost. Jesus immediately said to them, "Take courage." Jesus sends us out to be his disciples and most of us easily become afraid of what he's asking us to do. But Jesus always comes to calm our storms and see us safely through. Fear is real. But the courage God gives overcomes it.

August 16 "Faith Finds a Way" Matthew 15:21-28

Matthew 15:25 – "The woman came and knelt before him. 'Lord, help me!" she said."

Our own faith is being tested: our faith in God, our faith in our government, and our faith in each other. We're presently in the midst of a desert, wilderness journey, and we're not sure how long this journey's going to be.

In Matthew 15, Jesus had been focusing his attention on bringing his own

people to believe in him and live righteous lives. But amidst his ministry, he encountered a foreigner, a Canaanite woman, who cried out for Jesus' help. She was on a wilderness journey of her own. Her daughter was suffering terribly and she needed help. At first, Jesus did not want to be distracted from the focus of his work. But the woman persisted. "Help me!" she said, and Jesus saw her faith was sincere and helped her. We also will journey safely out of these wilderness times to a better future because our faith, sincerely displayed, will find a way forward.

August 23 "No One Can Do It for Us" Matthew 16:13-20

Matthew 16:15 – "But what about you?" he asked. 'Who do you say that I am?"

If we have difficulty doing our taxes, we can get a Certified Public Accountant to do them for us. If we need a new roof on our house we can get a roofing company to install one. If our car needs work, we can take it to our mechanic. If we have a tooth ache, a dentist will take care it. If we break a leg, a doctor can set it. Other people can do all these things for us. But there's one thing no one can do for us, that's state our belief in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior and mean it. No one can do that for us. We must do it ourselves.

In Matthew 16, Peter confesses to Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." But then Peter put his own interests in front of Jesus. And later, Peter denied even knowing Jesus. In his initial attempt, Peter didn't really surrender his life to Jesus. Fortunately, God continued to invite him to do so, and finally Peter did. What about you? Who do you claim Jesus to be? Have you surrendered your life to him? God continues to invite you.

August 30 "Take Up Your Cross" Matthew 16:21-28

Matthew 16:24 – "Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

Jesus obeyed God, all the way to death on the cross. In Matthew 16, Jesus calls for us to obey God's commandments to love God and love others and to follow Jesus – to make his ways our ways, to live as he lived. This is the Christian life. Some refuse to choose this life. But for those who do, it is a life that leads to peace, joy, meaning, and fulfillment.

Mary E. in France — Ministering to immigrants

A Personal Update



July 4, 2020-

Dear friends, so much has happened since confinement began in March. This is a long, personal update.

In brief: I got COVID right after Easter, had a relapse in May, and am feeling better but still have sore lungs. And God has met me in wonderful ways in the midst of it.

I got painful blisters on my toes right before Easter, so after almost a week I went to my doctor and she said they had just discovered this is sometimes a symptom of COVID-19. I wasn't tested then for the virus, but I had the classic symptoms. It was the strangest feeling to have the intense fatigue and deep aches throughout my body that I had only ever experienced when I had malaria in Tanzania. I also had a cough, and tightness in my lungs, as well as the feeling of something heavy pressing on the middle of my chest.

About a month after my first respiratory symptoms I felt like I was better, and had a great week of feeling well, only to have a relapse that was significantly worse than the first time around – not that I re-caught the virus, but that it probably hadn't actually left my body. I also developed (and caught early) a small respiratory infection, which was easily treated with antibiotics. I thank God that I didn't have to be hospitalized, and that even with the tightness and pressure in my lungs, I never had difficulty breathing.

In early June, I was tested for COVID — not to find out if I had had it, but to find out if it was still in my body (and thus if I was contagious). Praise God, it was negative! Now, July 4th, I have lots more strength and energy, but my lungs are still often sore, especially if I don't get enough rest or push myself too hard.

But let me tell you how God met me here. Back in March I mentioned how I was already missing being with people in person, and the comfort of a hug or even a handshake.

A couple weeks into confinement I was crying to God about this, and Isaiah 40:11 came to mind — that God is like a shepherd who gathers his lambs in his arms and holds them against his chest. I

felt God "say" (not audibly, but unmistakably) that He was there with me, holding me in His arms, close against His chest. And while I was still physically isolated, something changed, and my soul was satisfied. I still had moments where I felt lonely, but the sting of the lack was lifted.

The morning after my tentative COVID-19 diagnosis by my doctor, I was talking with God about the virus. I have often had respiratory infections and each time I have a respiratory issue, it scares me a bit, especially when I'm alone. I'm rather fond of breathing, as you can imagine. So the thought of having COVID-19 while in complete isolation was a scary thought. So I expressed this to God and just asked Him to join me in this. And Isaiah 40:10 came to mind - the image of God as the warrior king returning victorious from battle to his people. And I felt God "say" something along the lines of "I'm here, and I'm going to fight this battle for you. Don't be afraid." And friends, He did.

There were some scary moments, some tears (which didn't help the tightness in my lungs!), and days where I struggled with my attitude. Other days I had energy and could even sing again. But each day God was faithful. He was with me, and He fought that battle for me.

I don't generally like songs that "speak" for God, but "Take Heart" by Matthew West was my go-to song when the tightness would get worse.

I didn't always have much energy

or concentration to read the Bible, but I listened to worship songs in French, English, and Turkish — songs that expressed my heart to God, and that helped me to fix my eyes on God.

Near the end of May, when I was feeling well again, I decided to memorize Psalm 91. And while there are many beautiful and powerful facets to this psalm, I was captivated by the last two verses. Here God promises to deliver, protect, answer, rescue, honor, and save this believer in distress, but in the middle of those promises God says "I will be with him in trouble." And it struck me that God's deliverance, protection, etc. are not always in the way or timing we want (which I know and have experienced), but God is promising His presence in the meantime, in the waiting.

The very next day I started having noticeable respiratory symptoms again and had a relapse that was significantly worse than the first time around. I knew God would bring me through it, but I was deeply comforted by His presence.

Through all of this, I was also encouraged by family and friends, both in France and abroad, who prayed for me, brought me groceries and meals, talked with me, checked in on me (from a distance/by technology), and otherwise cared for me. I am so thankful for the many people who were expressions of the love of Christ to me, even those who don't yet know Him.

It's been almost three months that I've been sick/recovering. I'm not always very patient, and I've had days where I complained or had a bad attitude – so I don't want to give the impression that I lived this season perfectly. But God has been perfectly faithful – and I rest on His perfection, and not my own.

I don't know what situations lay ahead of me, or what you're facing right now, but I want to encourage you (and myself!) to seek Jesus and trust His promise to be with you in your distress, even as He is working out his salvation and deliverance, in His way and timing, for our good and (which is) His glory.
