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**"Salem Iron Men" digging deep into a series called *Becoming a King: The Path to Restoring the Heart of a Man***

**S**ince August 30th, the Salem Iron Men have been digging deep into a new video series called "Becoming a King" by Morgan Snyder, Executive Staff Member of Wild at Heart Ministries.

The series focuses on the following thoughts: Masculinity is in need of restoration. But how do you become the kind of man – the kind of king – to whom God can entrust his kingdom?

In this video Bible study, the Salem Iron Men are journeying with Morgan Snyder into a process that helps men recover true courage and vulnerability.

Curated and distilled over more than two decades, and mined from the lives of over seventy-five sages who have gone before us, Morgan shares what he discovered: an ancient and reliable path to restoring the heart of a man and becoming the kind of man who can wield power for good.

**Weekly Meetings**

Throughout the Fall of 2020, Salem Iron Men will be meeting weekly and virtually on zoom with rotating themes: On the first and third Sunday evenings our study will focus on the Gospel of John, while the second and fourth Sundays will be focused on the Becoming a King video series by Morgan Snyder.

## Worship Services are being recorded

A DVD is provided to Salem families who do not have access to a computer, upon request. If you have internet access and missed a Sunday service, the service can also be viewed at Salem's website SalemChurchWolfsville.org. Our thanks to Robin Haupt for editing the video.



**The sanctuary is open** for one service at 9:30 a.m. CDC protocol is being followed, i.e., wear a mask, observe 6' social distancing and use hand sanitizer (wall dispensers are available). There is no Sunday School at this time.

**The service is broadcast live** for those worshipping at home. Our equipment (video and audio) allows for interaction between those in the sanctuary and those at home. Those connected online can be seen and heard in the sanctuary and vice versa. This set up enables Salem members and friends to connect on Sunday morning, even if they are away on vacation or traveling to visit family.

**Lay Readers** — Lay readers are still participating in the service by providing the opening prayer, leading the Lord's Prayer, and reading the scripture. Now, with current technology, lay readers can either participate in the sanctuary or online from home.

**Return to worship in the sanctuary** — If you would like to return to worship in the sanctuary, there is room for you. Seating is assigned to ensure the 6' distancing rule is followed. Contact Pastor Bob to reserve a seat.

As of this writing, up to 23 people are worshipping in the sanctuary. Seats for visitors are also available.

You may set up recurring giving, e.g., weekly, monthly, or give one time. Funds will be automatically withdrawn from your checking or savings account.

Giving tithes and offerings is a part of our spiritual worship. We don't give in order to get. We give to make an impact; we give to make a difference in people's lives; we give to further the ministry of Christ.

Psalm 19:14 – "Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be pleasing to you, Lord, my rock and my redeemer."

As we know, David didn't always get it right. There were times when he sinned greatly. We'll fail also from time to time. But striving to please Him, to please God, we'll become the people he created us to be and we'll come to know the peace and joy God offers.

### October 11 "Keep Your Focus on God" Philippians 4:1-9

Philippians 4:8 - "Focus your thoughts on these things: all that is true, all that is holy, all that is just, all that is pure, all that is lovely, all that is worthy of praise."

Last week, we asked ourselves the question, "Is my life pleasing to God?"

This week, the apostle Paul provides us with a list of words that can help us measure our lives against the standard, "be pleasing to God."

For every thought we have, word we say, and action we take, we can ask ourselves, "Is it true, holy, just, pure, lovely, and worthy of praise?"

In our busy lives, as the pull of worldly things is strong and constant, this simple list can help us keep our eyes focused on God who created the world and all that is in it, and who desires for us a better way.

### October 18 Laity Sunday "You Are Loved and Chosen" 1 Thessalonians 1-10

1 Thessalonians 1:4 – "Brothers and sisters, you are loved by God, and we know that he has chosen you."

These words were written to encourage the Christian community living in a region called Thessalonica. They were good and helpful words then and they remain good encouragement for us now.

We are loved by God. Sinners that we are, we don't deserve God's love and we can't earn it. It's simply God's grace, his love freely given to us, acting in our lives for our good, no matter what we do.

And we are chosen by God. God turns to us and says, "I want you!" In God's eyes we are worthy, gifted, and precious. God should know — he created us! For us to know that we are loved and chosen, to say it to ourselves each morning before we start the day — the words "loved and chosen" — keeps us secure and allows us to live boldly.

### October 25 Reformation Sunday "Love the Lord" Matthew 22: 34-46

Matthew 22:17 – "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your being, and with all your mind."

We've been talking a lot this month about living a life pleasing to God. It's important! But sometimes, faced with all the choices we might make, it can get confusing.

We get tempted, all the time, to give in or give up. God knew it would be like this for us. So he gave us a simple, straightforward commandment to strive to live by. That commandment is "Love the Lord your God."

Last week, we looked at the way God loves us unconditionally and how God has chosen us to be his people.

What's our response? Honoring and respecting God, thankful for his love, isn't there a desire we're born with to love God back?

The desire might be overshadowed from time to time, or buried under layers of pain caused by life's circumstances, but isn't it there in us, that desire to love God? Maybe life's goal is, more and more, to allow our desire to become reality — to love God with our whole being.

### Pumpkin Spice Cupcakes

#### INGREDIENTS:

- |                                |                             |

| 2 cups sugar                   | 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon |
| 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin         | 1 teaspoon baking soda      |
| 4 large eggs, room temperature | 1/2 teaspoon salt           |
| 1 cup canola oil               | 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger  |
| 2 cups all-purpose flour       | 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves  |
| 2 teaspoons baking powder      | 1 cup raisins               |

#### CREAM CHEESE FROSTING:

| 1/3 cup butter, softened     | 2 cups confectioners' sugar      |
| 3 oz. cream cheese, softened | 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, toasted |
| 1 teaspoon vanilla extract   |                                  |

#### DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat the sugar, pumpkin, eggs and oil until well blended. In another bowl, whisk next 7 ingredients; gradually beat into pumpkin mixture. Stir in the raisins.
2. Fill each of 24 paper-lined muffin cups with 1/4 cup plus 1 teaspoon batter. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 28-32 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks to cool completely.
3. For frosting, beat the butter and cream cheese until smooth. Beat in vanilla extract. Gradually add confectioners' sugar. Frost cupcakes; sprinkle with walnuts. Refrigerate. Makes 2 dozen.

## News from the 236th session of Annual Conference

September 12, 2020 —

**In** a session that was hailed as historic, more than 1,330 clergy and lay people participated in the 236th session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, representing 619 churches.

This year's annual conference was held online to ensure social distancing and well-being during this season of the coronavirus pandemic. Pastor Bob and Dennis Leatherman represented Salem.

The one-day session, with Bishop LaTrelle Easterling presiding, contained three major items of business: Budget, Church Closures, and Ordination of Pastoral Candidates.

### COVID-19 Impact on Budgets

Finance and stewardship leaders on the Conference Council of Finance and Administration (CFA) went back to the drawing board several times in preparing the 2021 budget. This was due to the financial impact of the coronavirus pandemic on local churches, seen acutely in March, April, and May of this year.

CFA also authorized several adjustments to the 2020 spending plan to help local churches make it through these unprecedented times.

Some churches received a 3-month waiver of benefit payments and others received small church grants. Money was also set aside for any church that found themselves unable to pay a pastor's salary during the crisis.

Several resources were also made available to assist local churches with setting up on-line giving, and also help to stream online worship services.

Salem applied and received a \$1,000

technology micro grant from the Conference to purchase video and computer equipment which now enables Salem to broadcast live services online.

Many churches also benefited from the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) offered by the Federal Small Business Administration.

For many churches, the 2.5 months of payroll support became an important funding stream as they faced the uncertainty of no longer worshipping in-person and closing their buildings to pre-schools and other tenants.

The Conference Trustees also offered 3-month deferrals for the churches that had Conference loans.

In addition, health insurance premiums for pastors in the HealthFlex program were expected to go up in 2021.

However, the board rescinded the proposed rate increase. Thus, local churches will continue to pay the same rate for the pastor's health insurance for the fourth straight year.

### Church Closures

Conference members affirmed the closure of the following seven churches:

1. Bells Chapel UMC in Dickerson, (Frederick District)
2. Boring UMC in Upperco, (Baltimore Suburban District)
3. Deer Park UMC in Reisterstown, (Baltimore Suburban District)
4. Forest Memorial UMC in Forestville, (Greater Washington District)
5. Mount Carmel UMC in Brookeville, (Central Maryland District)
6. Saint James UMC in Westminster, (Frederick District)

7. Saint Luke UMC, in Monkton, (Baltimore Suburban District)

Whenever a church is closed and then sold, any proceeds from the sale go to the Baltimore-Washington Conference who uses the funds to foster new mission and ministry.

### Ordination Service

The Service of Ordination and Commissioning was held on the front lawn of the Conference Mission Center in Fulton, Maryland, and live streamed on the internet.

Three men and five women were ordained as Elders in The United Methodist Church. They are Daniel Breidenbaugh, Lorraine Brown (Cross), Alison Thomas DeLeo, Katie O'Hern Hamilton, Walter Daniel Jackson, III, Dana M. Jones, Irance Reddix McCray, and Monica Raines

Two people were commissioned as provisional Deacons, and six people were commissioned as provisional Elders.

In her remarks to the new pastors, Bishop Easterling said, "These are unprecedented, and often difficult times we are living in.

"The storms will come. Stay anchored. Stay anchored in the solid rock! His name is Jesus. ... My soul is anchored in the Lord; I pray yours is, too."

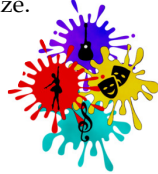
### One Talent
