MISSION PROJECTS - NEWS & UPDATES

Salem Mission Project No. 8

Society of St. Andrew · Potato Project

In 2021, through March, the Potato Project distributed 6,676,685 pounds of fresh produce in 183 events, with 232 volunteers. They distributed food donated by 14 farmers and packing houses to hungry people through 150 feeding agencies.



We salvage tractor-trailer loads of potatoes and other produce that are rejected by commercial markets or potato chip factories due to slight imperfections in size, shape, sugar content, or surface blemishes. Usually, these rejected loads end up at local landfills.

Through the Potato Project, the Society of St. Andrew is able to redirect these 40,000-45,000-pound loads of fresh, nutritious produce to food banks, soup kitchens, food pantries, low income housing areas, local churches, and other hunger agencies for distribution to the poor. Because this produce is donated, the Society of St. Andrew pays only for the transportation and packaging of the food—an amazingly low 9 cents per pound! That means they can provide food to the nation's hungry for about 3 cents per serving! [Salem provides \$25 monthly to this project.]

The Food Pantry is deeply appreciative of all the support they have been receiving.


At this time, the food pantry volunteers are asking for a temporary hold on donations due to upcoming renovations to the lower level of the educational building where the food pantry is located.

Message from the Pastor and Worship in May

could say many different things about the month of May. I could write about the warm weather to come. I could write about the events we have scheduled in May: our "Plant Sale" on May 8th and our "Music in the Meadow" concert on May 22nd.

I could share something about significant religious celebrations that occur in May: Ascension Sunday and Pentecost. I could share something about Mother's Day. And all those things would be fine things to write about. They are all important.

May 2 Fifth Sunday of Easter Holy Communion "Remain in Me" John 15:1-8

John 15:4 – "Remain in me and I will remain in you" It's good to have a goal in mind before we start a journey. Verse 8 of today's reading states the goal: "bear fruit,

showing yourselves to be my disciples."

Disciples of Christ bear fruit to build up the kingdom of God. That's the goal. How we reach the goal is discussed in Verses 1-7: "remain in Jesus Christ." "Remain in me" is repeated 6 times in seven verses. That's a lot of repetition; it must be important!

Sometimes we set a goal and begin our journey forgetting to take Jesus with us, or we lose Jesus somewhere along the way. If we're going to bear fruit for the kingdom, our lives need to be centered on Christ.

May 9 Sixth Sunday of Easter, Mother's Day "Sing a New Song" Psalm 98

Psalm 98:1a – "Sing to the Lord a new song for he has done marvelous things." "The Lord has risen! He has risen indeed!"

We love to say these words on Easter morning. Somehow, it doesn't feel like just saying these words does justice to our intense feelings on Easter.

What we really want to do is shout out the words over and over. "The Lord is risen! The Lord is risen! The Lord is risen! The Lord is risen indeed!"

We want to shout them out louder and louder because of the meaning the words hold for us: we are saved, Christ has prepared a place for us in heaven, and we can have hope! Each day is a new song waiting to be sung.

May 16 Seventh Sunday of Easter Ascension Sunday "More Than an Ascension" Acts 1:1-11

Acts 1:8b – "You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea

and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After 40 days of appearing to numerous people, Jesus ascended into heaven to take his place seated at the right hand of God to rule over all. It was part of God's salvation plan, but it left a vacuum here on earth. Who would continue Jesus' ministry? Who would tell people about him? How would more come to believe and be saved? Who would continue his caring ministry to those in need?

God had a plan for this. His plan was for the disciples to continue Jesus' ministry. He would empower them through the Holy Spirit to do this work. In our own time and place, we are those disciples. And like those who witnessed his ascension, we too are empowered by the Holy Spirit to continue Christ's ministry.

May 23 Day of Pentecost "What Does the Holy Spirit Do?" John 16:4b-15

John 16:13a – "But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all truth." The risen Jesus had promised to send the Holy Spirit once he ascended into heaven. Pentecost is the day each year that we remember and celebrate God sending the Holy Spirit to dwell among us.

What does the Holy Spirit do in the world and in our lives? We state our belief that the Holy Spirit is all around us, even in us. But that only tells us where the Spirit is not what the Holy Spirit does? What does it matter that the Holy Spirit is here? It matters because if we understand what the Spirit can accomplish and then allow the Spirit to guide us, our lives can be better.

May 30 Trinity Sunday "Glory" Isaiah 6:1-8

Isaiah 6:3 - "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory."

On the back of today's bulletin, writer Susan Mink reflects upon God's glory. She writes, "Glory means God's presence made known." The above verse then becomes, "the whole earth is full of God's presence made known."

Do we look at the world this way? What if we started to? God is present and is making himself known to us in people, in places, and in situations. How attuned are we to God's presence? If we were to become more aware, would it make a difference in how we live? What if we assumed God is everywhere, all the time.

Dear Folks at Salem Church: April 2, 2021

We trust that you are rejoicing in our God and His great love for us this Easter season. As the hymn says, "O the love that drew salvation's plan; O, the grace that brought it down to man! O, the mighty gulf that God did span at Calvary".

We want to thank you again for your continuing prayers and your financial help to us. We sincerely appreciate all you do for us and our ministries.

Frank just had a fairly bad case of COVID-19 and, even though he no longer needs to isolate, he is still weak and tires quickly. Nancy tested positive a week ago and has to stay quarantined a few more days even though she doesn't have symptoms. We'd appreciate your prayers for full recoveries.

Over the past couple weeks, and still at present, there have been a good many cases of COVID-19 at our church, including our pastor & youth pastor. Some services have had to be cancelled and we were unable to have special services that we normally would have had this Easter season. Undoubtedly that is true for most churches. But we certainly will be celebrating God's great love in the sacrifice of His Son that we might have spiritual life and forgiveness of sin!

A Tribute to Betty M. Brandenburg — November 13, 1932 - April 16, 2021



Funeral services for Betty M. Brandenburg, 88, were held at Salem on April 22, 2021. Burial was in the Salem Cemetery. The following are excerpts from Pastor Bob Snyder's remarks at the funeral.

In Betty's obituary, David and Stephen spoke of their mom's life as one of dedication to her Lord, her family and her church family here at Salem.

Dedication to Her Lord

Betty loved the Lord and lived out her faith in daily life. She was committed to remaining close to the Lord and centering her life on Jesus. She read and studied her Bible. Even when her eyesight became impaired, she acquired a reading machine so she could continue to read her Bible.

And she prayed frequently. Betty would tell me, "I wish I could serve in all the ways I used to be able to." And I'd remind her, "Betty, you are one of the best prayer warriors I've run into." We were blessed to have Betty praying for us as she did

Anything that spoke of her Lord and Savior was something Betty was interested in: hymns, poems, devotionals, the liturgy of worship, the beauty of nature, serving with other Christians, and more. Betty couldn't get enough of these.

And it rubbed off on us. It rubbed off on me. I remember well, the grace she showed going through losses the last several years. Loss of her own physical abilities, loss of their home, loss of being able to live with her beloved Howard in the same building in Williamsport until Howard's death in 2018.

I like to view the word grace as "God's love acting in our lives for our good." Even with all her losses, I could see that God's grace was at work in Betty. I could see it because she reflected to others in the way she continued to remain faithful, to be thankful to God, to have a positive spirit, and to make the most of each day.

Dedication to Her Family

In addition to being dedicated to the Lord, Betty was dedicated to her family. She was born in Wolfsville right next to the home she and Howard built. Betty went to school until the eighth grade when she had to leave school to help at home. It was a very proud moment when years later she took classes and received her GED from

high school, and then went on to use her hard won education as a proofreader at Doubleday.

Howard and Betty got married in 1958, and were married for 58 wonderful years. Before building their home on Martin Road, they lived in the stone house on the corner just across from Harne's Store, right outside our doors. After their move to Martin Road, they took Betty's mom in to live with them and all during their growing up years the boys had their grandmother close by in their lives, something they consider a blessing.

Like all loving couples their personalities seemed to meld very well together. Betty did for Howard and Howard did for Betty. They were partners in every good way.

Betty loved sewing. She sewed all kinds of different things: clothes, all the curtains in the house, and Halloween costume for the boys. She crocheted and did embroidery. I'm told she made the beautiful white paraments for the Easter Season that adorn the altar today.

She loved flowers and birds and kept a beautiful yard.

She loved gardening and canning of all kinds. And she loved baking of all sorts. Her cookie recipes still produce delicious

cookies being enjoyed by family and friends.

The family would make an occasional trip, but mostly not too far away and hardly ever overnight. Local family gatherings, church gatherings, family reunions, the Lord's Acre Festival – these were the mainstays of family life. And Betty loved it, and did her part in passing on to her children and grandchildren her dedication to family. If a family reunion was coming up you could expect a call from Betty reminding you of the date.

Dedication to Her Church Family

Betty was also dedicated to her church family. She'd say, "I was carried in here as a baby and one day I'll be carried back out." And Betty was here, present, with her church family every day in between.

She loved Lord's Acre and was generous in supporting it with her gifts of sewing and canning and baking and just being there to help in any way. Over the years she served on various committees of the church, sang in choir, played piano, served as Salem's Membership Secretary keeping detailed records, and served as President of our "Bee-lievers" women's group raising tens of thousands of dollars for Salem's Building and Improvement Fund over the years.

And Betty had a special heart for children going through tough times and she served as Treasurer and Membership Secretary of the Board of Child Care Auxiliary and led our efforts here at Salem to support the children.
