

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Salem to host Wolfsville Community Vacation Bible School

July 4 Independence Day "Hometown Visit" Mark 6:1-6 Guest Speaker: Bill Burrier Children's Time: "Seeds and a Farmer"

Mark 6:4 "Then Jesus told them, 'A prophet is honored everywhere except in his own hometown and among his relatives and his own family."" (NLT)

Jesus was born in Bethlehem. When He was very young, His parents fled to Egypt after they had been warned by God that King Herod would attempt to murder every child under two years of age (Matthew 2:13-14).

Some time later, after King Herod died, God directed them to return to

Israel (Matthew 2:19-21).

When the family returned, they settled in Nazareth, a small village in a region known as Galilee. That is where Jesus grew up. Consequently, Nazareth became Jesus' hometown.

Well into adulthood, and early in Jesus' ministry, He relocated from Nazareth to Capernaum, a small fishing village on the north shore of the Sea of Galilee.

The scriptures tell us Jesus returned to his hometown of Nazareth two times to visit family and friends.

This message will focus on Jesus' second visit to Nazareth, when, sadly, he was again rejected in his own hometown.

July 11 "Adopted" Ephesians 1:3-14 Guest Speaker: Gary Barkdoll

Ephesians 1:5a – "God destined us to be his adopted children through Jesus Christ because of his love."

One of the great blessings of our marriage was to adopt a child, give birth to two more children, and then adopt a fourth child. Just as we look upon our children as our precious treasure, so does God look upon each one of us, his precious children.

Ephesians 2:14a – "Christ is our peace."

Reflections on George's life

A Tribute to George C. Harne — June 19, 1942 – June 13, 2021

A private graveside service for George Charles Harne, 78, was held at Salem's cemetery on June 18, 2021.

Wolfsville, Lifelong Home

George loved Wolfsville, his lifelong home. He was born in a log cabin on Wildcat Road, was raised in his parent's home adjacent to Harne's Store, and he and Judy raised their own family in their home on Harp Hill Road, still within walking distance from the log cabin where George was born.

It was beautiful the morning George was laid to rest at the Cemetery of Salem Church. A beautiful day in Wolfsville seemed very fitting for a person who loved this place so much.

George was at home in other ways as well.

At Home with the Lord

First and foremost, he was at home with the Lord. He loved the Lord and we saw him striving to live out his faith in daily life.

George was quiet and unassuming and strong and wise. He took time to be with the Lord each day.

He attended worship every Sunday and was present at church activities and events.

Many, many people were recipients of his acts of kindness and caring. Over the years, he was a regular contributor to Salem's Food Pantry.

George was at home in his love for his family: Devoted wife Judy and adult children Todd and Jennifer; his sister Ruth and his extended family.


He was proud of who they had become and the ways they were serving their community.

Salem is located between George's architectural firm and his home on Harp Hill Road, so it was nearly a daily occurrence when I'd see George heading home sometime during the day to check in on things there. He was never far from the family he loved.

A Registered Architect

George was also at home serving as a registered architect.

I say serving because that's how he approached his profession and his life – serving others.



His relationships with people and his architectural designs have made a positive difference in the lives of people across several states and cities.

A Mentor

George was at home being a mentor. He would tell the story of his first job at Bowers Lumber Company where he met Fritz Bowers, Architect, and how he mentored George who was then aspiring to become an architect.

George was very thankful for Fritz' mentoring and has paid it forward many times over, most recently with Lee Ellen and Hank who are themselves very close to becoming architects having worked under George's supervision until his passing.

A Good Friend

George was also at home being a good friend.

Elvin tells the story of how he and George escaped and got their Sunday clothes dirty playing together as young boys in the fields around Salem Church as their parents talked inside the church building on Sunday mornings.

Over the last several decades, George and Elvin continued to be close friends and work together every day in George's architectural firm.

A Humble, Generous Man

George was a good and generous friend to many. He was a very good

observer of people and situations and seemed to offer just the right help just when it was needed.

I can't count the number of times he would make a call, arrange a visit, or draw up some plans to help out a person or group – quietly, generously, and humbly.

Whether playing a key role on a church-wide project, helping a young person with a summer job, visiting one in need, or engaging in some other kind act, George demonstrated his love for others in many ways.

From time-to-time, George would approach me and say, "You're doing a good job."

On Sundays during the height of COVID-19, he'd stop by the church after our small in-person and larger online service, and he'd hand me a paper bag with two pieces of that delicious homemade cake from Harne's Store, and he'd say something like, "Here's a little something, make sure Donna gets her piece."

I'll really miss his quiet kindness. He was a true gentleman, in the best sense of the term.

George was at home in many different ways, and now he's at home with the Lord.

He has received his reward and is now in his eternal home.

Thank you for what you have taught us about faith and life, George, and thank you for being our friend. Amen.
