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**CROP Hunger Walk: September 26, 2021**

The Wolfsville/Myersville CROP Hunger Walk returns this year, despite COVID. It will be held on Sunday, September 26, beginning and ending at Salem United Methodist Church in Wolfsville.

**Registration**

Registration will begin at 1 p.m. and the walk will start at 1:30 p.m.

Registration will take place outside, and walkers are encouraged to follow COVID guidelines with regard to masks.

The restrooms at the church will be available and hand sanitizer stations are throughout the facility.

New this year is a COVID waiver, required by sponsor Church World Service, to be signed by all walkers at the time of registration.

**What is a CROP Hunger Walk?**

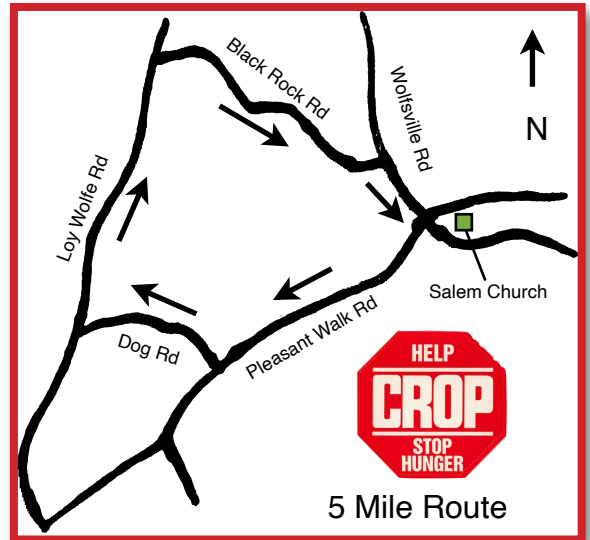
The CROP Hunger Walk is a team of people coming together to raise funds to stop hunger and poverty here in our community and around the world through Church World Service (CWS).

Church World Service is a faith-based organization transforming communities around the world through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster.

Twenty-five percent of the walk proceeds will be given locally to the Middletown Food Bank, the Salem United Methodist Church Food Pantry and the Frederick County Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs.

**5 Mile Route**

The local walk covers about 5 miles along Wolfsville area roads. There is a rest



stop about midway through. Route checkers drive along the route regularly to pick up anyone who cannot walk the entire route. No bikes, scooters or skateboards are permitted for insurance reasons.

**What do CROP walkers do?**

Each walker obtains sponsors for the miles walked and collects these funds either before or after the walk.

By walking with others in more than 2,000 towns and cities in the U.S., walkers help villages throughout the world have safe, clean wells near their homes.

Walkers help more than 3,200 local food pantries, food banks and meal sites in the U.S. to provide food to neighbors in need.

Walkers help share tools of hope in the wake of natural disasters around the globe.

Walkers help provide seeds, tools, blankets, chicks, tents, school supplies, education, job training and health formulas to developing nations, refugees and

disaster victims where needed.

As an example, Church World Service (CWS) is using CROP funds to respond to the recent earthquake in Haiti.

A dispatch from CWS on August 18, 2021, stated: "I want to share one bright spot regarding our work in Haiti as we assess the damage and needs in Haiti.

"CWS helped communities rebuild houses and schools following the 2010 Haiti earthquake and Hurricane Matthew in 2016. Our goal was to help build stronger structures that would withstand future disasters.

"We have heard from several communities where we helped rebuild houses and schools. None were damaged in yesterday's earthquake

from those communities we've been able to reach. The school will be ready to welcome students when the new school year starts in a few weeks.

"We are planning to bring this expertise and experience to our response to the recent earthquake.... Our response will include helping families rebuild with sturdier house designs and materials. We will also focus on water infrastructure and trauma recovery."

### September 5 Holy Communion “You’re My Favorite” James 2:1-13

James 2:8 – “If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, ‘Love your neighbor as yourself,’ you are doing right.”

It can be tempting to have favorites. You identify with the characteristics of one child over another and start favoring them.

Two people enter a room, and you favor the one who dresses and acts more like you.

One person has “made it big” in their career and you favor that person over someone who may not seem as



important.

Favoritism can come in many different forms and it usually ends up harming others.

Speaking through James today, God teaches us that to be obedient to God we are to love everyone equally.

God says, “Love your neighbor as yourself.” God says, “Have no favorites.”

### September 12 “Inner Thoughts” Psalm 19

Psalm 19:1 – “Heaven is declaring God’s glory; the sky is proclaiming his handiwork.”

Psalm 19 ends asking God to keep us from sin and to forgive us when we do. Then come the final words: “May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart by pleasing in your sight, O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer.”

When we disobey God, so often our harmful words and actions start with our inner thoughts; the meditation of our hearts.

Psalm 19:1-6 and 7-11 give us a way forward. Noticing God more, valuing God’s way and striving to obey him – these things build up the purity of our inner self.

### September 19 “Counterculture”

Mark 9:30-37

Mark 9:35b – “Whoever wants to be first must be least of all and the servant of all.”

On confirmation day, it feels good to confess with our words, “I believe in Jesus as my Lord and Savior and I pledge to follow him.”

But then the service ends along with the celebration of family and friends and the new confirmand is left to live out in daily life what they have promised. Help is available.

First, by God himself through the power of the Holy Spirit!

Second, through other Christians who are here supporting us.

Still, it is sometimes difficult to resist doing what the world is telling us to do in order to follow what Jesus desires that we do.

### September 26 “On Guard”

Mark 9:38-50

Mark 9:50 – “Salt is good; but if salt loses its saltiness, how will it become salty again? Maintain salt among yourselves and keep peace with each other.”

In swashbuckling movies there are frequently sword fights in which the protagonist yells out, “on guard!” announcing that the other should be prepared to fight.

There is an on-guardedness that comes with the faith journey as well: to be prepared and stay alert to the temptation to sin.

When we’re not on our guard a small sin can occur and lead to another greater one and all the while Satan is entering into our lives more and more to cause additional sin and harm.

It’s like salt losing its flavor. It doesn’t happen immediately but over time, one exposed day after another.

Learning what Scripture says about a life of faith, staying close to God during our day – this will help us stay fresh in our Christian walk and on guard against sin.

## This year's featured quilt was made by Caroline Grossnickle Leatherman, native of Middlepoint

**T**he featured quilt for this year's Lord's Acre Festival is in the "Dutch Girl" pattern. It is a never-used full/double size quilt made in the late 1950's and donated by Caroline Kemp Miller.

It is one of many quilts made by Caroline Miller's grandmother, Caroline Grossnickle Leatherman, who lived near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, at the time, but was a native of the Middlepoint area.

### Caroline Grossnickle Leatherman Leatherman

Caroline Grossnickle, born July 23, 1889, was the daughter of Charles Upton Grossnickle and his second wife, Martha Ellen Leatherman.

The family lived on a large farm near Middlepoint along Route 17 between Ellerton and Wolfsville, currently owned by the Hurwitz family.

On November 23, 1907, Caroline married Foster Leatherman, son of John W. Leatherman and Flora Elizabeth Gaver. They were the parents of Lloyd, Ella, Grace and Mae Leatherman. (Mae was the donor's mother.)

Sadly, the marriage ended in divorce in the early 1920's and Caroline and her children moved into the tenant house on her parent's farm.

In a few years, Caroline married Elmer Elias Leatherman, also divorced, son of John Henry Melvin Leatherman and Martha Ellen Grossnickle.

By 1927, Elmer had moved the family to a farm near Libertytown,



### Lord's Acre Featured Quilt "Dutch Girl"

This never-used full/double size quilt will be on display at the Lord's Acre Festival, September 11, beginning at 2 p.m. and will be the last item sold at the auction which begins at 6 p.m.

The quilt was donated by Caroline Miller. It was made by Caroline's grandmother, Caroline Grossnickle Leatherman, who lived near Gettysburg, PA, when she made the quilt in the 1950's.

Maryland.

Then, by 1930, they had bought a farm near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

Elmer Leatherman died in 1945 and the farm was sold to son Lloyd Leatherman. The widowed Caroline lived with her son for a while, but soon moved back to Maryland to live with and help take care of her father. They moved into the tenant house that Caroline had lived in earlier.

Her father went to live with another daughter, and about 1953, Caroline moved to a small house in Barlow, Pennsylvania, to be near her son. This is where she was living when she made the featured quilt.

Caroline lived in that little house until near the end of her life, when she was moved to Colton Villa Nursing Home. She died there on March 15, 1978.

### Sunday School Delayed

### Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference changed from in-person to online, due to COVID concerns

The 237th Session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, scheduled for October 25-27, will now be held entirely online.

As our country enters the fourth surge of COVID-19, conference leaders canceled the option of gathering in-person at the Hilton Hotel in Baltimore and retained only the online portion of this year's annual conference.

The three-day annual conference session will be live-streamed for everyone to watch. The plenary and worship services are being redesigned to best accommodate online engagement.

An in-person ordination service (which will also be live-streamed) will be held at a church near the Mission Center. Attendance will be limited to those being ordained and commissioned and a few of their family members and friends.

This decision was made out of an abundance of caution to address the potential threats raised by COVID-19 and the Delta variant.

Members will consider seven resolutions that have been submitted by groups and individuals in the Baltimore-Washington Conference, and the proposed 2022 budget.
