

What will happen at THE BRIDGE?

There will be lots of singing and music led by the Works In Progress Praise Band, a message from Pastor Bob that speaks to real issues in our daily lives, and time for sharing prayer requests and ways God is at work in our lives.

Video, lighting and other visuals will be used to create an inviting atmosphere.

The theme for the first BRIDGE service will be "Seeking God." Come as you are and bring the whole family. Children are always welcome in our services.

After the service, there will be refreshments and time for fellowship. The always-popular ping pong tables will also be available for those who would like to hang out and play.

Why is it called THE BRIDGE?

Our mission with this new service is to CONNECT FAITH AND LIFE –

learning and seeing how faith in God meets the challenges of real life. The image of a bridge is a great way to illustrate making that faith-and-life connection.

To get the word out to the community about THE BRIDGE services, Salem has launched several marketing efforts that include:

- mailing a large full-color postcard to many of our neighbors within a several mile radius of the church,
- placing a banner in the church's front lawn and yard signs around the area,

Mission Project No. 12

Compassion International - Sponsored Child in Tanzania

BARNABA

Barnaba lives with his grandmother on the plains of Chamwino, Tanzania. Typical houses are constructed of dirt floors, mud walls and corrugated iron roofs. The primary ethnic group is Wagogo and the most commonly spoken language is Chigogo.

The regional diet consists of corn, beans and green vegetables. Common health problems in this area include malnutrition, malaria and trachoma (eye disease). Most adults in Chamwino are unemployed but some work as subsistence farmers and earn the equivalent of \$6 per month.



Barnaba, Age 9 Tanzania

Salem's sponsorship allows the Chamwino Student Center to provide Barnaba with Bible teaching, medical checkups, tuition, tutoring, school supplies, field trips and recreational activities.

Salem has supported Barnaba since 2017 through Compassion International at \$38 per month.

Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference to be held virtually: June 1-3

The Annual Conference Sessions Team recently polled all clergy and lay members to Annual Conference to measure their intention to participate in the June session remotely or in person. The results reveal that if offered a hybrid option for annual conference, only 32% would choose to register to attend in person.

Given all of this research, the Sessions Committee has prayerfully discerned that it is in the best interest of our members to hold the 2022 Annual Conference Session June 1-3 over a virtual platform.

While we know there are trade-offs, the most significant being the loss of ability to gather in person for celebration, worship, discernment, and fellowship, we also believe we are at a time of great transition in our normal operating procedures. If COVID continues to affect our annual gatherings, we will pursue alternative ways to come together for worship and celebration.

The memorial service and the service of commissioning and ordination will take place at Glen Mar UMC in Ellicott City, by invitation only. This facility will accommodate the participants as well as many guests, in accordance with the most recent COVID guidelines at the time.

March 2 Ash Wednesday Worship Service – 7 p.m.

The Ash Wednesday service is an important start to the Season of Lent. During the service we acknowledge two truths: We are mortal and will die, but we will die in Christ. Because of this second truth, we have hope and can focus on living our very best lives, knowing that at the end of our earthly lives we'll be with Christ and our loved ones in heaven, living in our eternal bodies and free from all pain and suffering.

March 6

Holy Communion First Sunday in Lent "It's Simple" Romans 10:8b-13



If you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved (Romans 10:9).

A man approached the pastor and asked, "How can I be saved?" The pastor asked the man to repeat the words of Romans 10:9, "I confess that Jesus is Lord and I believe in my heart that God raised him from the dead." And the man was saved.

It's simple to be saved, but some make the road to getting there much more difficult. And others, after being saved, squander their gift from God. They have said the words, "I believe in Jesus" but then go about their lives trusting in self rather than in Jesus. Each day, let's not make difficult what God has made simple. Let's believe and trust in him.

March 13 Second Sunday in Lent "Choosing Hope" Psalm 27

I am still confident of this: I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the

living (Psalm 27:13).

David, though a king, had struggles. We might think that because he was a king he always lived a charmed life. But that wasn't the case. Foreign powers always threatened Israel, even his own son plotted to overthrow David's rule, and then there were David's own demons that sought to bring him down.

He was a king, but still just a man. The thing that seemed to make the difference for David over his lifetime was choosing hope over despair. David saw the "goodness of the Lord" as he lived out his days. Whatever our day brings, the goodness of the Lord is on display for those you choose to see it.

March 20 Third Sunday in Lent "A Worthy Search" Isaiah 55:1-9

Seek the Lord while he may be found; call on him while he is near (Isaiah 55:6).

These words might cause us to think that we must act before the Lord goes away. But nothing can be further from the truth. The Lord is always here beside us.

It is us that stray from him. This verse is a caution to act now to seek the Lord, before we run the risk of straying from the Lord. It is encouragement to seek him first in all we do so we can receive the love and care he desires to give us.

How earnestly do we live our days seeking after God? It is a good question to wrestle with during the Season of Lent, a time of self-reflection, confession, and renewal.

March 27


Fourth Sunday in Lent "Becoming New" 2 Corinthians 5:16-21

If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come! (2 Corinthians 5:17a).

Yes, we become a new creation but rarely is it instantaneous. As the name of our praise band testifies, we're "works in progress." We confess Christ as Lord, but that's just the start of our transformation.

With God's help, and the help of our Christian sisters and brothers, we are continually growing in our love of God and others. We are in a life-long process of becoming the person God desires us to be.

Sometimes, on the journey, we lose our way. During those times God stays with us to help us get back on track and help us learn important lessons of faith. This Lent is a wonderful opportunity to take stock of where we've been and where we might yet be going in becoming Christ's new creation.

Salem Mission Project No. 11

Care Net Pregnancy Center of Frederick 707 N. Market Street Frederick, MD 21701

The following things were accomplished by the Care Net Pregnancy Center of Frederick in 2021: 96 pregnancy tests performed, 14 ultrasounds performed, 27 STI appointments, 17 women were abortion vulnerable/minded and 11 chose to continue their pregnancy after receiving services at this center.

The Pregnancy Center staff had 104 spiritual discussions, 54 clients received the Gospel, and 39 clients agreed to have staff pray for them. The staff are thankful for each of these divine appointments. They are honored to share the love of Jesus and offer excellent services to their clients.

They are thankful for donors like Salem Church who give faithfully the center. Salem provides a minimum of \$50 each month to this organization.

Salem Mission Project No. 7

The Board of Child Care provides more than just a safe place for children to live and thrive. Their Residential Program and Community-Based Group Homes provide engaging experiences for youth within a safe, structured setting.

Their diverse multi-disciplinary team comprises medical, clinical, recreational, spiritual, and program staff. Together, they design and implement a comprehensive, customized treatment plan for each child in their care.

Youth served by their residential program supports their ultimate plan for discharge. They know that their team can never replace a family, and they work very hard to structure programming to support whatever the appropriate next step is for that youth.

No matter how a child came to be in their care, their goal is to create an environment where the child can grow to be successful members of their families and communities.

Every year, the entire offering at Salem's Christmas Eve program is given to the Board of Child Care. On Christmas Eve 2021, the offering totaled \$458.

Salem Mission Project No. 8

Society of St. Andrew Potato Project 3383 Sweet Hollow Road Big Island, Virginia 24526



The Society of St. Andrew salvages tractor-trailer loads of potatoes and other produce that are rejected by commercial markets or potato chip factories due to slight imperfections in size, shape, sugar content, or surface blemishes.

Usually, these rejected loads end up at local landfills. Through the Potato Project, the Society of St. Andrew is able to redirect these 40,000-45,000-pound loads of fresh, nutritious produce to food banks, soup kitchens, food pantries, low income housing areas, local churches, and other hunger agencies for distribution to the poor.

This produce is donated, so the Society of St. Andrew pays only for the transportation and packaging of the food- an amazingly low 9 cents per pound, which means food to the nation's hungry for about 3 cents per serving!

Salem provides a minimum of \$25 each month to this organization.

An active member at St. Mark's and well-known Wolfsville resident, Leah Spade, recently celebrated her 100th birthday on February 27, 2022.

Leah's life was highlighted in the January-February issue of St. Mark's newsletter which included a segment about Leah's interest in genealogy in the Wolfsville area, saying, "Many years ago, Leah began her extensive research into genealogy in our region. From families to schools to churches, Leah has compiled numerous volumes of information and photos that people all over the U.S. find of great interest. Her house overflows with history and she continues to update her notebooks regularly."

According to St. Mark's website, the church was organized in 1845, with the help of Rev. Christopher Columbus Culler. Two years later, in 1847, the cornerstone of the church was laid. Land for the church was donated by the Marken family from the "Good Luck" homestead, located just north of Wolfsville.
