June 5 Pentecost Holy Communion "Spirit-Led" Romans 8:1-17

Romans 8:14 - "For all who are led

Today is Pentecost, the day God formed the church and sent the Holy Spirit to dwell in the church and to lead us to be the people of God.

by the Spirit of God are children of God."

Are we a Spirit-led people? Do we allow the Holy Spirit to lead our lives?

As we journey through our days, do we search for how the Holy Spirit is present and at work in any given situation, and do we strive to discern what he would have us think and say and do?

Jesus faithfully delivered on his

Can we claim, "I am a Spirit-led person?" How might life be different if we were?

June 12 Trinity Sunday "It Works" John 16:5-16

John 16:13a – "When the Spirit of Truth comes, he will guide you into all truth."

The word Trinity is not found in the Bible, but the explanation of the Trinity - One God in three persons - is found in our Bibles.

John 1:1b, "The Word was God" (God the Father). John 1:14, "The Word became flesh and lived among us" (God the Son). John 16:13a, "When the Spirit of Truth comes, he will guide you into all truth" (God the Holy Spirit).

The complete understanding of the Trinity is beyond our grasp, because we lack the intellect and the vocabulary to fully define God.

The Trinity has been our best attempt, and this understanding of God works for us as we trust in God who continues to create us, saves us, provides the example of how we are to live, and even remains present with us to guide us through life. The Trinity works.

June 19 Father's Day "Essentials" Galatians 3:23-29

Galatians 3:26 – "For in Christ you are all children of God through faith."

Many things tempt us to be divided: our personal worldview, our position on current social issues, the beliefs and practices of the different church denominations people attend.

Still, there is one person who can unite us: Jesus. When we agree to believe in Jesus, we are much better able to work through the things that divide us.

In the year 48 AD, the church was bitterly divided over admitting Gentiles into the church. What resolved it? The belief among Jews and Gentiles alike that Jesus Christ is Lord and Savior of all.

When we disagree on the issues of our day, it's good to search for common ground; essentials upon which we can agree. Agreeing on Christ helps us work through our differences.

June 26 "Wonder Worker" Psalm 77:1-2, 11-20

Psalm 77:14 – "You are the God who works wonders; you have displayed your might among the peoples."

Do you believe in a God who still works wonders?

God created the entire universe and keeps it in motion. God freed the Israelites from slavery in Egypt and led them to the Promised Land. God returned the people of Judah back home after they had been exiled in Babylon.

God came as Jesus to save us. God formed the church and sent the Holy Spirit which dwells in us. God is with us and guides us through life every day.

Some day God will take us by the hand and lead us to our eternal homes, and someday Jesus Christ will return a final time to restore the earth to perfection.

RECIPE



Savory Sweet Roast

INGREDIENTS:

3-4 lb. beef roast

- 1-2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 medium-sized onion, chopped
- 10.75 oz. can cream of mushroom
- 1/2 cup water

- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. In a large skillet, brown roast on all sides in olive oil.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a mixing bowl, blend together all other ingredients.
- 3. When roast is browned, place in roasting pan. Pour sauce ingredients over meat
- 4. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 2 hours, or until tender.
- Let meat stand for 20 minutes. Slice and serve with sauce. Makes 6-8 servings.

TIPS:

- The sauce that the roast is cooked in makes a succulent gravy. Serve over the meat, and over potatoes, rice, or pasta, if you've made one of them as a go-along.
- 2. You may wish to cut potato wedges and place them on top of the meat before roasting it. You may also do the same with julienned carrot sticks. Either of those combinations gives a good meal all in one pan.
