In June, we opened a new regional office on the Delmarva Peninsula. We're working hard to build a network here to bring good food to those in need on the peninsula and beyond. Your support makes our work possible.



Society of St. Andrew staff in this region coordinate, equip, and lead volunteers to enter farm fields after the commercial harvest and simply pick up the tons of good, edible produce left behind.

Each year, the Society of St. Andrew deploys and coordinates hundreds of volunteers to glean millions of pounds of farm-fresh food across the nation. We make all of the arrangements with farmers, produce containers, and food distribution.

People of all ages can glean. Most gleaning events are scheduled in the morning and can last three to four hours. Gleanings are scheduled on weekdays and on Saturdays. -Jean Siers, Delmarva Regional Director, Salisbury, MD

August 7 Holy Communion "Be Kind" Ephesians 4:21-32

Ephesians 4:32 – "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

Trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean and reverent.

These are the twelve principals that scouts are taught to live by. Together they are known as the Scout Law.

When I read today's key verse, the word "kind" jumped out at me, and that's when I remembered it being included in the Scout Law.

Receiving kindness and being kind to others are things most of us can identify with.

Perhaps it's because being kind is at



the very heart of who Jesus was and who we're called to be.

Hebrews 11 is a listing of saints, provided to motivate readers to persevere in their faith.

ne day I found myself in another rough patch because of my health. Despite my best efforts, I was losing function. Discouragement swept in like high tide.

When I shared my struggle in an email to my friend Angela, she sent me a link to an online worship song. I clicked the link on my laptop.

As the music began, my grandchildren tapped at my bedroom door. They'd just returned from the park— faces red and sweaty, water bottles in hand. Pausing the song, I sank to the floor, and they snuggled into my lap, full of giggles, with hair smelling of sunshine.

My heart flooded with joy. I was reminded that Jesus often comforts us in the midst of ordinary moments.

We expect our Savior to strengthen our faith and rebuild our hope through spiritual means: worship music, reading scripture, praying with a friend.

We can get into a habit of seeking spiritual nourishment only on Sunday mornings or when we read a devotion during our quiet time.

We may forget that He is speaking to us constantly. When we acknowledge Him, we learn that He shares His presence and his blessings through many means, including the ordinary, humble experiences of our daily lives.

The above verse in Zephaniah reminds us that sometimes Jesus shows His love for us in mighty acts, sometimes in quiet moments, and sometimes in exultant song.

Let's be alert to various ways Jesus reminds us of His love today.
