

Mission Project No. 11

Care Net Pregnancy Center of Frederick

Dear Salem United Methodist Church:

Life at the center continues in this post Roe world. We are seeing more clients that are vulnerable to abortion, and specifically inquiring about the abortion pill. We are thankful we can offer clients education on the procedures and risks of abortion, offer an ultrasound to confirm the pregnancy so she



can see fetal development within her own womb, and engage in spiritual discussions as much as possible.

In the past month, we have seen clients receive all of the above. In some cases, the services they have received have equipped them to continue their pregnancy and we rejoice over these decisions. In other cases, even with the services they received, clients have continued in their decision to terminate their pregnancy. I saw one of these clients after her decision to abort. She shared how terrible it was for her, and with tears in her eyes she asked if God would forgive her. We had a conversation about the depth of forgiveness that God offers us.

THE FEATURED QUILT at this year's Lord's Acre Festival, September 10, 2022, will be a Double Wedding Ring pattern.

The quilt is being donated by the Annabelle Martin estate. Annabelle passed away on August 31, 2019, and her daughters, Darlene, Barbara, and Kathy selected this quilt from Annabelle's collection to be donated to the church to be sold at the Lord's Acre auction.

According to Kathy, Annabelle purchased the quilt top in Lancaster County, PA, and had Kaye B. Derr of Middletown, quilt it in 1994.

Annabelle donated the quilt to Salem's 1994 Lord's Acre Festival and liked it so much she bought it back at the auction.

According to the October 1994 issue of The Mountain Shepherd, the Lord's Acre Festival of that year featured two quilts-

a Striped Star quilt pieced by Salem's oldest living member, Eva Morgan, and the Double Wedding Ring quilt donated by Annabelle Martin.

The two quilts topped the Lord's Acre auction sales. The Striped Star quilt brought \$350 and the Double Wedding Ring quilt brought \$525.

What is a Lord's Acre?

The Lord's Acre program was begun as an interdenominational movement among country churches in western North Carolina in 1930, as a means of raising funds in small congregations with limited financial resources. A portion or "acre" of a church member's land was set aside to raise crops to be sold to benefit the church. Livestock was also dedicated for this purpose. Those without land could set aside a portion of their needlework, craft items, or any other saleable talent they possessed. The Lord's Acre Festival is a sale of those donations. Salem's Lord's Acre Festival, an annual event which began in 1960, works just that way. Most everything sold is donated by members and friends. What comes in is a surprise to everyone!

September 4 Holy Communion "Unimaginable, Yet True" Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18a

Psalm 139:17-18a – "How precious to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand."

Today's Bible verses communicate the depth of God's intimate relationship with us. He knows our thoughts and actions. He knows how we're uniquely built and how we handle things.

These verses also describe God's loving care of us, surrounding us with his presence and comforting us with the touch of his very own hand.

And the verses tell of God's special interest in us, knowing how our whole life will unfold from the very beginning



when He formed us. Anyone else loving and caring for us in this way is unimaginable. But with God, it's true!

September 11 "God's Mercy" 1 Timothy 1:12-17

1 Timothy 1:15 – "Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Jesus Christ came into the world to save sinners – of whom I am the worst!"

In these verses, the Apostle Paul confesses, "I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and a violent man."

But God saw the good in Paul and was merciful to him. God believed in Paul. He poured out his grace into Paul and gave him the strength to overcome his sin and become a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Paul witnessed what this meant to him: "Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen."

Sinners that we are, let us be merciful to others as God is merciful to us, and let us witness to others the difference Jesus Christ has made in our lives.

September 18 "Experiencing God's Peace" Psalm 4

Psalm 4:8 – "I will lie down and sleep in peace, for you alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety."

In this psalm, David is expressing the peace he finds in the Lord. David's peace is not one which is experienced just when life is going smoothly. It is a peace that undergirds his life.

He begins his prayer, "Answer me. Give me relief from my distress."

But David seems to be reminding himself and witnessing to others his trust in God, especially in times of distress: "Know that the Lord has set apart the godly for himself; the Lord will hear when I call to him ... Offer right sacrifices and trust in the Lord."

And then David expresses the peace he has experienced by trusting in God, "You have filled my heart with greater joy than when their grain and new wine abound. I will lie down and sleep in peace, for you alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety."

In God, David found his peace in good times and bad. God offers this same peace to us.

September 25 "Practicing Contentment" 1 Timothy 6:6-19

1 Timothy 6:6 – "But Godliness with contentment is great gain."

In these verses the Apostle Paul is writing to Timothy, his coworker in Christ, encouraging him to continue to live a godly life and to be content with what God has given him.

Timothy had a dilemma. False teachers were trying to influence Timothy's congregation to do ministry for their own financial gain.

Instead, Paul encouraged Timothy to lead his flock to, "pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness" and "be rich in good deeds, and be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasures for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life." A godly life, contentment with what we have: these are the riches worth pursuing.

A Tribute to Delores V. Myers

Delores V. Myers September 3, 1936 - August 2, 2022

Pastor Bob Snyder's remarks from Delores' graveside service, August 5, 2022.

elores was born on September 3, 1936, the daughter of Paul and Gladys Adams. Things were tough. The family was poor and needed to move from house to house. Still, Delores was able to complete her high school education, graduating from Middletown High School.

She met Olvey Myers, they fell in love and were married. It was a marriage that lasted 65 years until his passing five years ago in 2017.

Delores had a big heart. As parents aged, Delores took them into her home to live and made sure they were cared for.

Delores became an accomplished seamstress back at a time when there were sewing companies here in this area. She worked for three of them: Sagner Sewing Factory in Frederick, London Fog Sewing Factory in Boonsboro, and Union Bridge Clothing Company in Union bridge.

The sewing skills she developed came in handy. She sowed beautiful things for family members. And we all benefited from her sewing skills.

I can remember going to one of my first Lord's Acre Festivals held at the Wolfsville Ruritan Park, and seeing Delores setting there behind the table with all the fancy needlework that was on sale that year; needlework beautifully done by Delores and other ladies from our church.

Delores was a great cook too, presiding over Lord's Acre soup making, a big project every year, preparing meals for monthly Ruritan Club meetings, and always contributing tasty dishes at church gatherings.

Her potato salad was a sought after dish. One church member testified the other day, "It was the best potato salad I've ever eaten."

Delores was a key member of our "Bee-lievers" women's group at church and loved serving with Miss Olive and all her other friends in the group. I can imagine her having a great time in heaven right now with friends she's

missed that had died before her.

Delores especially loved to cook for her family and friends. As people would share, "this person or that is going to be able to attend." Delores was known to quickly respond, "the more the merrier!"

She loved her family and loved having them all gathered together. Very soon after grandson Matt's birthday each year, the family would travel to Silver Beach for vacation. On his birthday, Matt would already be packed for the upcoming trip.

Until recently, they had made that trip together for over 30 years and I imagine each year about this time Delores was very excited about special times together with family at the beach.

As grandchildren came along, and they got old enough to date, and marry, and have kids of their own, Delores was delighted to be surrounded by them all.

One of the last pictures of Delores, taken just a month or so ago, is a picture of her holding a baby. Like she always said, "The more the merrier!"

Delores liked gardening and her flowers. In years past I can imagine Delores canning all the bounty that came from the family garden and all the beautiful flowers. She liked to take trips too: trips to Chincoteague, trips to Lancaster County, trips with Phyllis. Delores liked being on the go!

Delores was strong-willed. She'd tell you what she thought and what she wanted, but, going back to those years when she took in and cared for parents, it was always motivated by her big heart. She loved God and saw caring for and serving others as her way of thanking and honoring God for all he did for her.

Today's service gives us an opportunity to pause and reflect on our own life and our own faith at this time in our lives, and to ask ourselves an important question, "How is my own relationship with God?"

Lord, thank you for giving us Delores. Free her from suffering, and may she live a wonderful eternal life with you and her loved ones. And may we live the rest of our lives here on earth in a way that honors and is pleasing to you. Amen.

Wilton Gomez and his wife, Deyanira, lead a family ministry at their home church in Barahona. They feel God's call on their lives to share their knowledge and experience of



living out a Godly marriage. Wilton, who serves as the Director of Evangelism and Social Action in The Least of These Ministries, believes that "in these times, marriages are being attacked in many different ways. It is up to us Christians to be God's instrument to help others in their marriages."

Recently, the couple began an outreach in Batey Mena Abajo aimed at encouraging married couples to live out a God-centered marriage.



Facility Maintenance by Salem's Board of Trustees

Automated External Defibrillator

After some serious supply chain delays, Salem has finally received supplies needed to keep the church's Automated External Defibrillator (AED) up to date.

The new defibrillator battery typically lasts 4 years, keeping the AED in a "ready to use" condition as well as running self tests. Also, we finally received the cartridge of "adult" electrode pads, which must be replaced every two years.

As of this writing, the "infant/child" pads cartridge was still on backorder. The company has advised that Salem's existing supply is still usable.

Parsonage Freezer Replaced

The upright freezer in the basement of the parsonage has decided to quit working. Salem's Council approved the purchase of a new GE 21.3 cu. ft. Frost Free Upright Freezer, white in color.

The parsonage freezer is used when room is not available in the commercial freezer located in the church kitchen. For example, broth for Lord's Acre soup is typically stored in the parsonage freezer.


