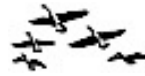

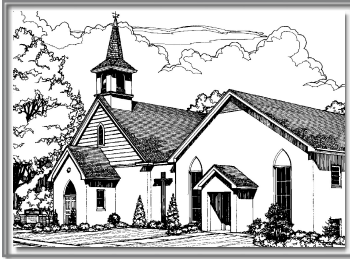

The donuts, coffee and juice supplied by the Wolfsville Ruritan were very much appreciated again this year. Thank you!

April showers bring May flowers, and again this year, Salem will be having our annual Community Plant and Food Sale on the Saturday before Mother's Day.

A good variety of beautiful flowers grown in Lancaster County and hand-selected will be available as well as good food. Please come.

Shifting to worship during May, I'll be starting a sermon series titled "The Five Big Stories of the Bible."

During the series, we'll learn these stories and how to access the help God is offering us through them. Summaries for the first few weeks of the series are included below.

I pray the series is helpful to you as you continue to encounter God through Bible study. May God bless you greatly during the month of May! —*Pastor Bob*

May 7

Holy Communion

Story 1 - "Creation and Fall"

God created all that is, including the first humans, Adam and Eve. God commanded them to obey him – He created them and knew what was best for them.

God gave Adam and Eve freedom to make choices, so they could experience His love to the fullest.

Adam and Eve chose to disobey God and separated themselves from God.

When they sinned, they brought tough consequences upon themselves. They had



to leave the Garden of Eden; the perfect place God had made for them to live. Still, God did not abandon them and continued to care for them.

Adam and Eve had children, and they had children, one generation after another.

People thought they could control their own lives and didn't need God. Human sin became worse and worse.

The consequence for such great sin was harsh – human life was almost destroyed.

Still, God did not abandon humans. God renewed his promise to love and care for us.

May 14

Mother's Day

Story 2 - "The People of God in Exodus, Covenant, and Exile"

God formed the people of Israel through whom all people came to know God, delivered the Israelites from slavery, and led them to the homeland God provided for them.

Good and bad people ruled, the nation split, God warned the kings and the people that they would lose their nation if they continued to sin against God. Sin continued and the nation fell, first the Northern Kingdom/Israel to the

Assyrians in 722 BC, then the Southern Kingdom/Judah to the Babylonians in 586 BC.

After about 50 years of exile in Babylon (about 586-538 BC), God provided for the people of Judah to return home.

They resettled in and around Jerusalem and rebuilt the temple.

During this time other Books of the Bible were written teaching God's wisdom, and expressing the joys and sorrows, and hopes and fears of the people of Israel in their daily lives.

May 21

Ascension Sunday

Pastor Bob will be helping to lead a "Seven Mile Walk with Jesus" spiritual retreat.

Wanda Barkdoll will be leading worship and delivering the sermon at Salem.

May 28

Pentecost

Story 3 - "Jesus the Messiah"

It takes all four Gospels to tell the good news of the birth, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ.

The Story told by Mark—

The disciples did not understand Jesus' identity and mission. God's simple rule is to love God and love your neighbor. We are to take up our own cross and live like Christ.

Mark emphasizes Jesus' humanness and shows Jesus as a man of action and authority.

The Story told by Matthew—

Critical of religious leaders of his day, Jesus did not replace the law of the Old Testament but fulfilled the law.

Matthew emphasizes Jesus' great teachings and provides a Jewish viewpoint.

The Story told by Luke—

Many Jews would not believe in Jesus, so Jesus moved beyond them, converting non-Jews/Gentiles. Jesus reached out to those on the fringes of society. Jesus tells us how to use our possessions.

Luke emphasizes Jesus' divinity and the theme of joy and provides a Greek viewpoint.

The Story told by John—

Speaks of life in the kingdom between Jesus' death and final return. Through signs/miracles John identifies Jesus as the true Son of God and long-awaited Savior. Jesus reveals who God is and what God is like.

John speaks of how the Holy Spirit is at work within us.

RECIPE



Blueberry Muffin Buckle Cake

INGREDIENTS:

Crumb Topping

3/4 cup granulated sugar	3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/3 cup plus 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour	1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons butter (room temperature)

Cake

2 cups all-purpose flour	1 egg
1 cup granulated sugar	2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup butter (room temperature)	1 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup milk	2 1/2 cups fresh blueberries

Glaze

2 cups powdered sugar	2 teaspoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla	

DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees.
2. Spray a 9" square baking pan with nonstick spray, set aside.
3. In a large bowl, combine all the crumb ingredients with a fork until they are combined well. Set aside.
4. In another large bowl, mix together all the cake ingredients except the blueberries until well incorporated. Then fold in the blueberries.
5. Spread the cake batter into the prepared pan and sprinkle evenly with the crumb topping.
6. Bake for 45 minutes until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.
7. Allow the cake to cool for 10 minutes before attempting to remove.
8. Mix together all the glaze ingredients until smooth and then drizzle on top of the cake.

Sue Ellen Stottlemeyer made this cake for the "Adult Discussion Group Sunday School Class" snack. Class members requested the recipe.

Disaffiliation “Transition Teams” Formed at Salem

Salem’s Church Council formed a Transition Team, led by Michael Burrier, that is working to complete the steps necessary for disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church and to implement the Independent Church Plan as outlined by the Independent Church Exploratory Committee.

The Transition Team reports to the Church Council and consists of several working groups to focus on specific areas of the plan.

The Transition Team was announced to the congregation on Palm Sunday, April 2nd, and members and active participants in the life of the Salem congregation were invited to serve on one or more of the five working groups. Thank you to each person who responded to the call.

The following summarizes each working group, its role, its membership, and actions taken to date. A progress update will be provided each month in *The Mountain Shepherd*.

By-Laws / Constitution

Role: Responsible for making recommendations to the Church Council for the church’s new by-laws and constitution (how Salem will organize itself and operate going forward), which must be written and adopted before the Legal Work Group can complete its work.

Actions: On April 20, 2023, Church Council approved the structure and legal names for the new non-profit corporations that will be formed to receive the church assets and property currently held in Trust by the United Methodist Church. Meredith Harshman, leader of the Legal group, and the church’s attorney, Michael Delauter, Esq., will work together to complete these steps. Mr. Delauter’s legal advice will guide the final structure of the corporations.

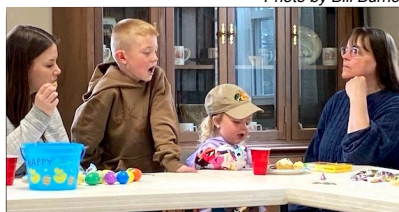

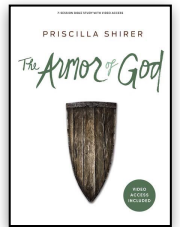

Meredith is a retired CPA and will be actively assisting with the legal aspects of Salem's disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church.

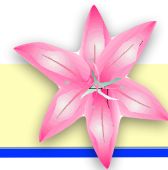
New Leaders at Salem's Food Pantry

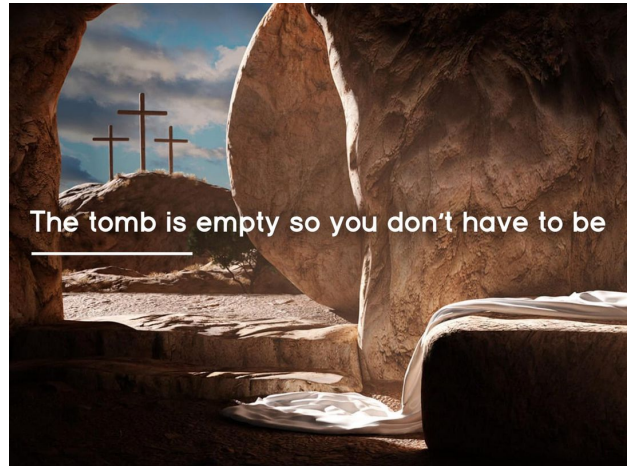
Patrick Boyton and Tara Birriel will continue to volunteer their assistance at the Food Pantry. Our thanks to all who support this ministry.

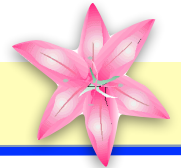

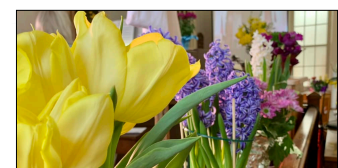
