3. Salem Mission & Outreach (local needs)

On December 13, an accidental fire damaged the home of Carroll and Teresa Six on Loy Wolfe Road displacing 7 adults and 1 child. At Salem's worship services on December 17 & 24, an offering plate was available for a free-will offering to help this family. The total offering received was \$2,062.35.



4. Christ Cream Ministry (Tim Leber)

NEW FOR 2024 — Salem's Church Council has added a new mission project for 2024, Tim Leber's Christ Cream Ministry. Mr. Leber, a retired Middletown High School teacher, gives out free ice cream from his ice cream truck, with a prayer. He goes wherever invited, church events, youth activities, family reunions, etc. Salem will provide \$50 monthly to this ministry. See the full story on page 7.

6. Travis & Mary (AIM)

Travis & Mary have been ministering for the last year and a half in Strasbourg, France, where they are a part of AIM's Borderless teams reaching out to immigrants and refugees. Their location will be changing in February 2024, to Calgary, Canada, with the same focus on immigrants, just a new location. They are hoping to spend April and May in the States, connecting with their supporting churches. This may be an opportunity for us to see Mary again and meet Travis and Mélodie. [In 2023, Salem gave \$1,380 to this ministry.]

RECIPE



Beef and Cabbage Soup

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 15-oz. cans kidney beans (reserve 1/4 cup bean broth)
- 1 16-oz. can beef broth
- 2 15-oz. cans crushed or stewed tomatoes
- 3 cups chopped cabbage 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/2 teaspoon dried marjoram
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon A-1 steak sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. In heavy saucepan, cook beef and onion until browned. Drain.
- 2. Mash together 1/4 cup beans and 1/4 cup bean broth.
- 3. Add all items to meat and onions. Cover and simmer for 45-60 minutes.

A great cold-weather soup. Delicious when served with warm cornbread.

Message from the Pastor and Worship in January

"New Wine" and Communion

am certain that title got your attention! I want to clarify some items and communicate others, as well. I referenced the "new wine" in the title because it refers to a principle Jesus taught.

In Mark's gospel (2:22) Jesus said that they did not put "new wine into old wineskins or else the wineskins would burst."

What that means is that the new wine was still in the fermentation stage and the process of fermentation would burst the older wineskins which had become hard and rigid.

His solution was to put new wine in new wineskins so they would both be preserved.

Why does that matter? It gives us a great lesson on how we will be doing some aspects of ministry going forward.

A particular example is communion. I am in favor of communion.

Communion is not a sacrament (in that it does not save us). However, it IS an ordinance, which means it should be done regularly and consistently as a reminder of Christ's death on the cross to pay for our sins and offer salvation.


However, the Bible gives no standards on how or when to observe communion.

I would like to see us observe communion on a regular basis (at most once per month and at least once per quarter), and I am trying to begin the first Sunday of January to start off the new calendar year.

Communion services are to be personal and reflective.

My style of communion service is quiet and somber because we focus on the horrible death of Christ on the cross and the love that sent Him to that cross.

Being served the elements in the pews,



where the people are, helps to make the service feel more personal; like each of us is personally at the foot of His cross pouring out our hearts in a broken and contrite spirit.

This approach proves to be very inspirational for our daily Christian walk.

For those of you who wish to continue going to the front to partake in communion, I would propose that we begin the year by offering both.

Those who wish to come to the front to be served can do so, and anybody who prefers to remain in the pews can be served there, as well.

I am not saying the way communion used to be done here is wrong.

It is just that I want us to be open to doing things differently because, fundamentally, Salem Community Church IS different from Salem United Methodist Church.

I want to encourage you as your pastor, to be open to the "new wine" of an independent, community church and not be focused on the old wineskins.

I believe we will ALL enjoy the worship experience, together.

Worship in January

I trust you have enjoyed your Christmas season and I pray the Advent sermon series was a blessing to you. (Quite frankly, you were probably getting tired of Isaiah 9:6!)

We will begin 2024 with a series of sermons from the Book of James. Expository preaching is where you address full passages of Scripture from a verse-byverse format ('exposing' the Scriptures; hence, the term "expository").

Eighty-five percent of my sermons are expository compared to fifteen percent that are topical. Here is a glimpse of the sermons for January:

January 7, 2024 James 1:1-8

"Consider it Pure Joy"

Trials in life are inevitable. We will consider the purpose of trials and our perspective through trials. We will discover what God does for us when we are facing those trials and, hopefully, we will gain a more peaceful attitude when trials arise.

January 14, 2024 James 1:9-18

"The Difference Between Trials and Temptations"

"Blessed is the man that perseveres under trials." We will see the difference between trials and temptations, and we will see how the cycle of sin draws us to turn our backs on God. On the bright side, God showers us with blessings that brighten our days.

January 21, 2024 James 1:19-27 "Pure Religion"

You have heard it before: "we have two ears and one tongue so we would listen more than we speak." We are also reminded that we need to "live" the message of our faith, not just listen to the message. This passage of Scripture is to remind us of what the bottom line for the Christian life should be. It is called religion that is pure and faultless.

January 28, 2024 James 2:1-13

"Pride and Prejudice"

With all due respect to Jane Austen, this title is more geared towards the sin of favoritism. Unfortunately, we can obey almost all of the law and yet stumble in one area and James said we are guilty of violating the whole law! We are reminded of the principle that, "Mercy triumphs over judgment."

Regular participants in the life of the congregation who are not formal members are welcome to attend congregational meetings but may not vote.

Meeting Dates

Normally, the annual meeting will be held in early November, but due to our recent disaffiliation timeline and the hiring of a new pastor, it was not possible to hold a meeting in November of 2023.

Salem adds new mission project for 2024 Christ Cream Ministry (Tim Leber)

Tim Leber was a coach, teacher, and leader of Fellowship of Christian Athletes at Middletown High School. Now retired from teaching, Tim has a ministry called Christ Cream where he gives out ice cream from his ice cream truck, with a prayer. While teaching, Tim often said when he retired he didn't want to just retire from something but rather retire to something.

The Christ Cream ministry began very simply. Tim was on vacation in the Outer Banks 10 or 15 years ago, and while standing on the front porch he watched an ice cream truck drive by and he noted, "all these kids flocked to it and they were all happy and smiling and excited." At that moment, he said, "It was like 'bam', that's what I'm going to do when I retire. And this is what God put on my heart— you're going to call it Christ Cream— I was like, okay and He said you're going to give the ice cream away for free, I said okay, and you're going to pray with all those people and I said okay and I love it. It's simple, it's just ice cream and prayers."

Tim explains how the Christ Cream Ministry was formed. "It's been an awesome ministry to be a part of. I thank God for it. I retired as a teacher. I looked for a vehicle. I purchased a van. I got the van wrapped. I bought a freezer. I had to do all the insurance and then started going out to churches, vacation Bible schools, outdoor picnics, Middletown High School events, family reunions, wherever I was invited. The biggest event I have attended was the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Power Camp and there were about 350 kids there and I have a freezer that fits about 360 ice creams, so it was perfect. Some people would come up with cash. I'm like, no, there's no money, and then some people asked me if I take Venmo, which I had to laugh because I don't even know what Venmo is, but I'm like, no, this is free ice cream and then I would say prayers with them."

Tim's van is a work of art. The impact of the Christ Cream truck is a product of collaboration including graphic input from Middletown High School teacher John Mattingly who teaches Computer Graphics and designed the wrap. Tim said,"Look my man, this is not a wrap, this is a piece of art, so he actually signed the back bumper. Every place I go I try to bring the attitude and the energy that God wants me to bring. God is an awesome God and he can change hearts and he can change lives and he changed my heart and he changed my life and I thank Him for that."

God can turn your messy life into a masterpiece.

Every life gets messy at times. Sometimes these messes are literal, like a house that would be easier to condemn than to clean. But sometimes they are intangible messes such as illness, conflict, depression, abuse, bankruptcy, divorce, and job loss. And these messes can be painful, hurting our hearts and our homes. But as we see in the Bible, God loves to use messy people!

In this study, we will dig into the lives of Biblical heroes who were messy people just like us but who were used by God in powerful ways. Together we will examine the stories of five wonderful but messy people and one messy parable character: Rahab, the Prodigal Son, Josiah, Mary, David, and Daniel. From their stories, we will learn how God can use broken people, restore damaged hearts and relationships, give us power to handle our critics, and help us deal with the hard moments of life.

The Least of These Ministries (Dominican Republic)

For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light. -Ephesians 5:8 (CSB)

December 12, 2023 — We would like to share the testimony of Milta, a church leader in one of the communities in which we serve [in the Dominican Republic].

Milta tells of how her 7-year-old son led her to a relationship with Jesus. She said, "One day, my son—he was about 7 years old at the time—went to the church's Bible School and came home very sad. I asked him, 'what's wrong?' He told me, "Today I received God in my heart and they taught us that the only way to go to heaven is Jesus, so that means that you will not be in heaven with me, because you have not received



Jesus in your heart.' In that moment, I collapsed in tears. I felt that God spoke to me through my son. I knelt down, sent for Pastor Estela and told her God spoke strongly to my heart, and I want to receive Jesus in my life. From that day in 2006, until now I serve the Lord."

She had been living in the darkness of the world around her, refusing to except God's offer of salvation. That was 17 years ago. Since then, she has been serving Jesus, walking as a child of light. Country Churches Christmas Tour . . . from Myersville to Wolfsville to Foxville

The photo at right of Salem's sanctuary was taken by Robert Buckheit during the "Country Churches Christmas Tour" sponsored by the Myersville-Wolfsville Area Historical Society.

Mr. Buckheit posted the photo on Facebook with the following description:

"Thirteen different churches from Myersville to Foxville were open to visit to see their holiday splendor and learn some history of the churches and their congregations.

"I have not had time to go through the hundreds of photographs I shot yesterday but wanted to post one for this Sunday morning [December 17, 2023].

"This image is from my very first stop on the tour which was at Salem Community Church in Wolfsville.

"This church sits right along Wolfsville Road as you enter town from Ellerton and Myersville.

"The church was founded in 1819 as Salem United Brethren in Christ Church and has some original natural stone portions of the building which was constructed in 1847 covered with stucco.

"One of the features of this church is the painting "Christ Praying in Gethsemane" by C. Guy Stambach above the alter, and original 1937 lights in the sanctuary. The building style reflects the

simplicity of its early Brethren roots.

"In this image I captured the painting which sits above the alter along with the many Christmas decorations in the pulpit area. Members of the church actually lit the alter candles and Advent candles in the front of the church which made for a great addition to this photograph since all the lights gave off a

starburst pattern of light if you look closely. The red and white poinsettias and the greens wrapped around the railing gave the perfect Christmas look and feel to the church."
