

More about the Salem Church Bell

n last month's "Mountain Shepherd" we featured an article about Salem's Level. Many of you hear the bell ringing every Sunday morning about a half hour before worship begins at 9 a.m. That sound is a reminder of the bell's message "Come to church, come to church."

In last month's article, the origin of the bell seemed to be in question. Well, much to our delight, the answer has been revealed.

During Salem's 200th anniversary year (2019), Fonda Gormer wrote a series of 14 articles for this newsletter expanding on Salem's history and the church's relationship to the Wolfsville community.

In the chapter titled "A Sanctuary for Salem Church," Fonda's research uncovered some additional facts about Salem's bell that were not previously a part of Salem's historical writings.

Forty-six years after the original church building was constructed, the church was rebuilt. Fonda's article described it this way:

"On April 26, 1893, J. H. Maugans,

C.C. Stottlemyer and the trustees were appointed to a building committee to rebuild the church. This was a major rebuilding according to a newspaper account in The Valley Register, which reported that the roof was taken off, seats and windows taken out, walls rebuilt and the steeple and outside woodwork repainted."

Fonda's article also reveals the origin of Salem's current bell, saying, "John H. Maugans donated the 600-pound bell which was placed in the belfry of the new [rebuilt] church."

So, thanks to Fonda's excellent research, we know the origin of our bell. It is interesting to know, the bell being rung today dates back to 1893, that's 131 years, but it's message is still the same, "Come to church, come to church."



In 1893, Salem member John H. Maugans donated the 600-pound bell which is still being rung every Sunday morning at Salem.

RECIPE



Cheesy Chicken 'n' Shells

INGREDIENTS:

- 1-1/2 cups uncooked medium shell pasta
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1/4 cup water
- 1-1/4 cups chicken broth
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1/2 cup process cheese (Velveeta), diced

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning

1/8 teaspoon paprika

1-1/2 cups cubed cooked chicken

3 tablespoons dry bread crumbs

1 tablespoon butter, melted

DIRECTIONS:

- Cook pasta according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a saucepan, combine the flour and water until smooth. Gradually stir in broth.
- Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Reduce heat; add the soup, cheese and seasonings. Cook and stir for 5 minutes or until cheese is melted.
- 3. Drain pasta; place in a bowl. Stir in soup mixture and chicken. Transfer to a greased 1-1/2-quart baking dish. Toss bread crumbs and butter; sprinkle over the top. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until golden brown. Yield: 2-4 servings.

Theology at the Grocery Store

he other day I was at a grocery store in Frederick. I have loyalty cards for every store we use, so I scanned my loyalty card at the checkout register.

Then I heard those beautiful words we all love to hear. "You've earned a \$2.00 discount", said the cashier with a smile. This was followed by a question: "would you like to claim those savings today?"

Without hesitation, I answered that I did, indeed, want to save money today.

She then instructed me to go to the screen and click the "REDEEM" button. And that got me thinking.

To "redeem" means to buy back something. As we read in, I Peter 1:18-19, we see the concept of redemption.

Peter wrote, "18 knowing that you were not redeemed with perishable things like silver or gold from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers, ¹⁹ but with precious blood, as of a lamb unblemished and spotless, the blood of Christ."

So, we see that God, our loving Father, redeemed us from our sinful way of life. But the price He paid for our redemption was not silver, gold, or any other tangible material.

The price God paid to redeem us (buy us back from sin) was the precious blood of Iesus.

We still have Easter in our mind and can reflect on the substitutionary death of Christ, coupled with His powerful resurrection, so we still have the picture in our minds of the blood of Christ being shed for us.

In a practical application, I must ask myself if I am living my life in a manner that pleases God. It is something like trying to keep God from having "buyers' remorse"!



The famous philosopher, Friedrich Nietzsche, once said, "I would believe in a redeemer if God's people lived like they were redeemed."

What does this mean? It means that God chose to redeem ANYONE from sin who would accept Christ as their Savior. And the price God was willing to pay was the precious blood of His only begotten Son.

It also means that the redeemed were bought back from sin and defilement. We must not return to the lifestyle that characterizes these aspects.

Why does it matter? We need to live like we have been redeemed so others might believe in our Redeemer.

It will not be as easy as clicking "REDEEM" on a grocery store screen, but it is the mission to which we were all called.

Memorial Day • Decoration Day • Poppy Day

e give thanks on Memorial Day that we live in a free nation and we honor those who gave their lives for that blessing. Memorial Day is sometimes called Decoration Day. Since World War I, it has also been called Poppy Day.

The location of the first observance of Memorial Day is in dispute. Some claim the custom of honoring war dead began in Boalsburg, Pennsylvania. Others claim the custom was originated by some southern women who placed flowers on the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers after the Civil War.

According to one writer, the first Memorial Day service took place on May 30, 1866, on Belle Isle, a burial ground for Union soldiers in the St. James River, at Richmond, Virginia. The school

superintendent and the mayor planned the program of hymns and speeches and had the burial ground decorated with flowers.

In 1966, however, the U.S. Government proclaimed that Waterloo, New York, was the birthplace of Memorial Day. On May 5, 1865, the people of Waterloo had honored soldiers who had died in the Civil War. The custom of placing flowers on graves is an old one that exists in many countries.

Today, almost everywhere around the globe, people have a special day to honor not only those who gave their lives in battle, but also family members and friends whom they wish to remember. The northern states and some southern states celebrate Memorial Day on the last Monday in May. This date was made a Federal holiday in 1971.


