The Lord has blessed our Lord's Acre Festival 64 times

A big "Thank You" to the Wolfsville community for **LORD** once again supporting our Lord's Acre Festival.



The following morning at Sunday worship, Bill Burrier, Church Treasurer, gave a preliminary financial report to the Salem congregation.

With the church's growth and many new faces since the inception of Salem Community Church one year ago, Bill began his report with a brief history of the event.

Bill said, "We have done this 64 times: 10 times in the old Wolfsville School and 54 times at the Ruritan Park.

"The first Lord's Acre was in 1960 and the profits totaled \$742.34. If you adjust that number for inflation, the equivalent to that amount today would be \$7,742."

The numbers from this year's event show just how much the Lord has blessed this ministry and how much it has grown over these many years... i.e., it is now three times bigger than the initial event.



The rocks are the important things — your family, your partner, your health, your children — anything that is so important to you that if it were lost, you would be nearly destroyed.

The pebbles are the other things in life that matter, but on a smaller scale. The pebbles represent things like your job, your house, your car.

The sand is everything else; the small stuff. If you put the sand or the pebbles into the jar first, there is no room for the rocks. The same goes for your life. If you spend all of your energy and time on the small stuff, material things, you will never have room for the things that are truly most important.

Pay attention to the things that are critical in your life. Play with your children. Take your partner out for dinner. There will always be time to go to work, clean the house, give a dinner party and fix the disposal.

Take care of the rocks first — the things that really matter. Set your priorities. The rest is just pebbles and sand.

For a little over six decades, Salem has celebrated the annual Lord's Acre. On the evening I interviewed with the Search Team last August, there was a meeting of ladies to work on plans for the Lord's Acre. I gathered it must be quite an event.

When I came here as your pastor, I saw activities and calendars being filled with things to do to prepare for the Lord's Acre.

I had no idea what to expect, but it was suggested I not schedule any major activities the days after the Lord's Acre. Something in my gut told me I should heed that advice.

So, September 14th came, as promised. We were blessed with absolute perfect weather. For the rest of the day, Misty and I experienced our first Lord's Acre. It was an amazing day, and I learned some life principles during Lord's Acre.

Life Principles

First, good things happen when everyone works together.

Worship for October

Sunday, October 6, 2024 Communion Sunday "The Tribulation: The Anti-Christ and False Prophet" Revelation 13:1-18

There is the Holy Trinity consisting of God the Father, God the Son, and God, the Holy Spirit. But in the Tribulation, there will be an Unholy Trinity. This will be made up of Satan, the Anti-Christ, and the False Prophet. The first seal judgment was the arrival of the Anti-Christ. However, for the first half of the Tribulation, his role will be that of a peacemaker and world leader.

This chapter will see more of the insidious acts of the Anti-Christ, as well as the arrival of the False Prophet.

Sunday. October 13, 2024, Homecoming Sunday "The Seven Bowl Judgments" Revelation 16:1-21




