RECIPE



Blue Ribbon Cheesecake

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- (1 stick), melted
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 11/2 cups sugar
- 3 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a 13" by 9" glass or ceramic baking dish, mix crumbs, butter, cinnamon, and 1/2 cup sugar until crumbs are evenly moistened. Reserve 1 cup crumb mixture. Press remaining mixture firmly onto bottom of dish.
- 2. In large bowl, with mixer on medium speed, beat cream cheese, eggs, vanilla, 1/8 teaspoon salt, and remaining sugar until creamy, about 3 minutes. Add sour cream; beat 30 seconds or until blended
- 3. Pour cream cheese mixture over crust and spread evenly. Bake 20 minutes. Remove cheese cake from oven; sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Return to oven; bake 10 minutes longer. Turn oven off; leave cheesecake in oven 1 hour. Remove and cool completely on wire rack.
- 4. Cover and refrigerate until well chilled, at least 3 hours or overnight.

Makes 16 servings.

Death is Defeated

aster is around the corner. It is a rare holiday that is on a different date every year. Fortunately, this year it comes in late April, so the weather should be more pleasant than in years past.

But while the dates and weather for Easter change from year to year, the meaning of Easter does not!

Easter Sunday is the climax of Passion Week (also known as Holy Week). "Passion" comes from the Latin word, passio, which means "suffering" or "enduring", and the week begins with Palm Sunday and finishes with Easter Sunday.

Easter Sunday is the day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. He had been crucified. He died. And He was buried in a borrowed tomb.

The gospels tell us that on the first day of the week, the women went to the tomb to place spices on His body, but he was no longer in the tomb. He was gone, and that is the <u>fact</u> of the resurrection.

But to understand and enjoy Easter more, we need to realize the <u>impact</u> of the resurrection.

The resurrection of Jesus was different than when Lazarus was raised from the dead. In the case of Lazarus, he was raised with a physical body that eventually died again. Jesus was brought back to life with a spiritual, eternal body.

Paul described him in 1 Corinthians 15:20 as being "the first fruits of them that slept."

Therefore, because Jesus was raised with a glorified body, all of us who are born again believers will be raised one day with a glorified body.

That is <u>part</u> of the impact of his resurrection. The other part of the impact is found in 1 Corinthians 15:54, 55.

Paul wrote... because of the resurrection of Jesus, "death was

swallowed up in victory." Death had lost its sting. Death was defeated.

We should live like death was defeated. That means we do not have to be afraid of death because it no longer has the power to keep us from God.

So we see the impact of the resurrection is twofold:

- First, because Christ was resurrected, we will one day have a glorified body.
 Second, because of His resurrection,
- death has been defeated.

 These two blessings are good reasons to

These two blessings are good reasons to celebrate Easter.

Worship in April

This month will be very busy and very diverse. We will conclude the series on Jonah, observe the Passion Week from Matthew's gospel, and begin the next sermon series, "the Dear John Letters", where we will be learning from the epistles of I, II, and III John.

This year has Easter coming almost as late in the season as possible, so April will be a very full month.



Sunday, April 6 "Do You Have a Right to Be Angry?" Jonah 4:1-11

Jonah was angry about the outcome of his preaching. The entire city of Nineveh repented and received salvation.

Jonah complained to God because his preferences and desires were not fulfilled.

God rebuked him by asking if he had the right to be angry. We will look at Jonah and his response more closely.

We will also have guests in the service from "The Least of These Ministries" speaking about their work in the Dominican Republic (Salem Mission Project No. 10.



Sunday, April 13 Palm Sunday "The Road to the Cross" Matthew 21:1-11

Shouts of "Hosanna" rang through the streets of Jerusalem as the Messiah came through town on a borrowed donkey.

The people were looking for a military leader to deliver them from the Roman government.

What they "got" was the Son of God who had come to save them from spiritual affliction.

Palm branches will be given out this day.

Thursday, April 17 Last Supper Reenactment "Surely, not I, Lord" Matthew 26:17-22

This live reenactment gives insight into the upper room during the last supper. Each of the disciples will give their defense as to why he could not be the one Jesus predicted would betray Him.

Some traditions call this "Maundy Thursday" because "maundy" is the word from the Latin word "mandatum" which means "command." Since Jesus commanded the disciples to display genuine love for one another, tradition called this day "Maundy Thursday."

Since this phrase doesn't appear in the Bible, this service is known as the "last supper reenactment."

Friday, April 18 Good Friday Service "The Crucifixion" Matthew 27:32-46

We continue the Easter weekend worship by commemorating the death of our Savior on the cross. Jesus was to die for the sins of the world, as prophecy foretold.

However, prophecies also declared that He was to die on a cross via crucifixion.

This type of death was the most excruciating and disgraceful death, usually reserved for the most hardened of criminals. Jesus could have called down a legion of angels to take Him off the cross, yet he did not.

We will be observing communion on this day as we remember His crucifixion that made our salvation possible.

Sunday, April 20 Easter Sunday "The Resurrection" Matthew 28:1-10

Our Savior had died. Our Savior had been buried. Every leader of all world religions experienced death. The difference between those leaders and Jesus, however, is that Jesus rose from the dead and lives, seated at the right hand of God, to this day.

The death of Jesus was to defeat sin, but His



resurrection is to defeat death! 1 Corinthians 15 tells us that sin has been defeated and death has lost its sting.

That passage also describes Jesus as the first fruits of all who "sleep." The same manner in which Jesus was resurrected, we, too, will be resurrected in a glorified body.

Sunday, April 27 "Walking in the Light"

1 John 1:1-10

John wrote about Jesus being the Word of life and, as such, is the basis for our fellowship. He then changed his discourse to give us guidance on how we should walk in the light.

The passage repeats a phrase throughout, and that phrase is "if we". These are phrases of cause that lines out how we, as believers, should live this Christian life for the glory of God.

Together, we will examine the truths of these first ten verses that John wrote as the introduction to these three letters.



Advancing Ministry in Wolfsville

Sunday, March 9, 2025 — At the second congregational meeting of Salem Community Church, Wolfsville, the membership participated in the election of officers and was informed about church financials, mission projects including the food pantry, the work of Salem's Board of Trustees, and a report from Pastor Neil.

Gathering · Member Count Call to Order · Welcome · Prayer

Theresa Haupt, Secretary of Salem's Church Council, recorded attendance, and Vernon Stottlemver, Chair of Salem's Church Council, called the meeting to order, welcomed everyone and offered an opening prayer.

Election of Officers

Michael Burrier, Chair of Salem's Nominating Committee, presented a slate of officers for the congregation's vote of approval which included 16 positions and committees.

The congregation was also informed of 29 additional positions, committees and Sunday School teachers that had been previously approved by Salem's Church Council and did not need a congregational vote. Officers are listed on pages 7, 8 & 9 of this newsletter. A few minor constitutional changes were also voted on and approved.

Church Treasurer's Report

Bill Burrier, Church Treasurer, presented a detailed Treasurer's Report which included income and expenses for all of last year (2024) and the budget for this year (2025).

Attendance has significantly increased as well as offerings, and we are pleased to say we have started this year on very good footing financially.

Salem Mission Projects: Last year, Salem paid out slightly more than \$40,000 to its 13 internationally. More than half of that and 3rd through 6th grade children. He amount went to "local" outreach projects, continues to have a close relationship including the Food Pantry ministry; with Wolfsville Elementary School teaching children from our elementary school who might not come to church but who come to Heroes' Club to learn about Fridge" Outreach Campaign. the ways of God; and other local needs.



Join us for the Last Supper Dramatization

The men of Salem Community Church, Wolfsville, will present a living dramatization of Leonardo da Vinci's "The Last Supper," on Maundy Thursday, April 17, at 7:00 p.m.

Church members will attempt to duplicate the look and feel of da Vinci's famous painting, where he chose what he considered to be the most dramatic moment of The Last Supper, that moment just after Jesus said, "One of you will betray me."

Instantly, the 12 apostles became men of 12 different moods. The only composed person was Jesus himself. In the excitement, Judas overturned the container of salt... and Peter drew his knife. Some of the apostles just stared at Jesus in amazement... some just looked at each other in unbelief.

At the beginning of the service, the apostles will move up the main aisle, take their places at the table, and casually mingle. Jesus will then proceed up the aisle and take His place at the table. Once Jesus takes his place, Jesus and the apostles will go into a motionless pose like the ones in the painting. Each will come out of their pose only to speak.

In turn, the 12 apostles speak their minds to themselves, to each other, and to Jesus. They are reflecting on the tragic words which they had just heard Jesus speak. Those words being, "One of you will betray me." Each will end their dialog with the dramatic words "Is it I"? Everyone is invited to attend.

Jesus Predicts Peter's Denial — "Simon, Simon, Satan has asked to sift each of you like wheat. But I have pleaded in prayer for you, Simon, that your faith should not fail. So when you have repented and turned to me again, strengthen your brothers." Luke 22:31-32 NLT

When Jesus spoke of sifting, He was referring to separating the valuable portion of us from the worthless portion, shaking out what doesn't serve His purposes. Sifting can come from crisis. It can be the result of our actions or the actions of others.

The above scripture contains a game-changing discovery when Jesus prayed over the sifting of His followers, that their faith would remain intact.

As Good Friday dawned, they would need their Savior's prayers.
