Salem Mission Project No. 8

Potato & Produce Project — Society of St. Andrew, Big Island, VA

Thank you, Salem Community Church, for making the Society of St. Andrew your partner in ending hunger, with your continuing financial gifts.

Through these gifts, you are sharing fresh, nutritious produce with people who simply don't have enough to eat.

The Society of St. Andrew in Big Island, Virginia, welcomes volunteers to help salvage potatoes and other produce by the tractor-trailer load. Volunteers glean this produce from fields which would otherwise end up in landfills or would be left to spoil in the fields.

Instead of letting this food go to waste,



Salem's financial contributions are helping to make sure it goes to feed hungry Americans.

The Society of St. Andrew's Potato & Produce Project also salvages tractor-trailer loads of potatoes and other produce that is rejected by commercial markets due to imperfections in size, shape, or blemishes. These rejected loads might also end up at local landfills, but instead, the Society of St. Andrew redirects these 40,000-45,000-pound truckloads of produce to hunger agencies for distribution to people in need.

Harvest season for several fruits and vegetables is already underway in many parts of the country. Your continued support will help us feed families who are in need of food assistance throughout the spring and summer.

Thank you for all the ways your congregation reaches out as the hands and feet of Christ, and thank you especially for your many years of faithful concern for our hungry brothers and sisters.

Salem to get new Audio-Video System

Salem recently contracted with Audio Video Group in Frederick to upgrade and improve the audio visual capabilities in Salem's sanctuary.

The current audio system was last upgraded in 2014 with a new analog mixer and CD recorder. That system was audio only—no video.



Then, during the COVID pandemic in 2020, a camera, projector and laptop were added to give video capability so that Salem could broadcast worship services "live" on Zoom. In those days, most of the congregation was on Zoom

due to the social distancing guidelines from the State of Maryland.

When the camera, projector and laptop were added back in 2020, the placement of those items in the sanctuary were not permanent and therefore took up seating space in the pews. After the pandemic, the same system continued to be used. Salem's worship attendance has doubled in the last year and a half and continues to grow. Therefore the space taken up by the camera, projector and computer are needed for seating as we continue to grow.

During the last six months, an audio visual team consisting of Salem members Robin Haupt, Jim Laky, Bobby Fogle, and Michael Burrier have been working on details as to what a more permanent upgraded audio visual system at Salem would look like.

After contacting several companies, the Salem team worked with Audio Video Group in Frederick to fine tune a proposal that would meet Salem's current needs and be flexible to expand when needed in the future.

The President and Founder of Audio Video Group, Eric Johnson, attended a recent Salem Church Council meeting to explain the details of their 11-page proposal. The Salem team put a tremendous amount of work into this project and recommended Council approval. After discussion, Council approved the project to be funded from Salem's Building and Improvement Fund.

The installation is expected to take five days, Monday through Friday, and three to five people will be working on the project. An installation date has not yet been scheduled.

Equipment must be ordered first and will include Loudspeakers, Jacks & Accessories; Amplification & Digital Signal Processing; Allen & Heath SQ-Rack Digital Audio Mixer; Microphones, Jacks & Accessories; Laser Projector with zoom lens; 24" Confidence Monitor connected to a wireless HDMI transmission system; Marshall "Pan, Tilt, & Zoom" Camera; HD Video Switcher; Video Workstation; 75" 4K interactive flat panel display for the Salem social room on a mobile cart. This display will be used to enable an overflow crowd to view the service in the sanctuary. The display can also be used for other presentations taking place in the social room.

In addition to the new equipment, some of the existing equipment used by the current system (if compatible) will be used along with the new. —*Bill Burrier*

RECIPE



Pecan Pie Bars

INGREDIENTS:

2 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/8 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup butter or margarine 1 cup packed brown sugar 1 cup light-colored corn syrup 1/2 cup butter or margarine

4 eggs, lightly beaten

21/2 cups finely chopped pecans

1 teaspoon vanilla

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, stir together the flour, granulated sugar and salt. Using a pastry blender, cut in 3/4 cup butter until the mixture resembles fine crumbs. Press the mixture evenly into a greased 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 15 to 18 minutes or until lightly browned, set aside.
- 2. In a medium saucepan, combine the brown sugar, corn syrup and 1/2 cup butter. Bring to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat.
- 3. Place the eggs in a medium bowl. Gradually stir about 1/2 cup of the hot mixture into eggs. Return all mixture to saucepan. Stir in pecans and vanilla. Pour nut mixture over baked crust.
- 4. Bake the bar cookies for 30 to 32 minutes more or until the filling is set. Cool in the pan on a wire rack. Cut into bars to serve. Makes 20 to 32 bars.

I Would Like It NOW, Please!

have a confession. I sometimes struggle with patience. Not in dealing with people, I struggle with wanting things done according to MY timeline! However, the more I grow in my faith, the more I realize that God's timeline is not always MY timeline.

This reminds me of a well-known New Testament story in the eleventh chapter of John's gospel. I am referring to the story of Lazarus being raised from the dead.

If you recall the story, Jesus and His disciples were in a village a mere two miles away from Bethany, where Lazarus was sick. Jesus heard His dear friend was sick. Yet He waited to go and see him.

Jesus knew the scope of the Father's plan. He told His disciples that this sickness would not result in death, but that "it is for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it" (verse 4).

That is the breakdown between the perception of Jesus and the perceptions of Mary and Martha. Jesus was surrendered to the Father's plan, whereas Mary and Martha were leaning on their own plans. Even though Jesus was two miles away and could have been there in time to save Lazarus, He chose to linger.

Mary and Martha both rebuked Jesus for getting there too late. They told Him that IF He had been there, their brother would not have died. Again, we must remember that Jesus said He would be glorified because of the illness of Lazarus.

Jesus arrived in Bethany and, after the scathing words from the sisters, He asked where they had laid him. Martha hesitated because Lazarus had been buried for four days. This introduced the obstacle of the Law because there was no physical chance of a person coming back to life after four days. Additionally, there



was the physical side effect that by that time, there would be a foul odor.

You know how the narrative ends. Jesus called Lazarus to come forth. The stone was rolled away, and Lazarus came out, blindfolded and bound. Jesus demanded that they loose him and let him go. God was glorified and the power of Jesus was verified.

What does it mean? This narrative teaches us that God is sovereign, and His plans trump my plans. My timeline is irrelevant compared to God's timeline. Our timelines are irrelevant compared to God's timeline. Jesus delayed His arrival so that He could raise Lazarus from the dead.

Why does it matter? It matters because when we understand that God's timing is tied to God's purpose and plan, we can be a little more patient when things aren't done when we want them done. I might even learn to be more patient when things do not happen WHEN I think they should!

Worship in June

Sunday, June 1 Heroes' Club Sunday 1 John 3:11-24 "What's Love Got to do With It?"

We know that the world will hate us, if we are abiding in Christ. However, we are compelled to love one another. This is proof of our faith. John wrote that Jesus loved us so much, that He laid down his life for us. In the same way, we need to be willing to lay down our lives for each other. To truly abide in Christ would mean to love each other unconditionally.

Sunday, June 8 Communion 1 John 4:1-6 "Testing the Spirits"

There were (and still are) religious groups who claim to have a message from God. These claims were and are attempts to get people to follow them with unquestioning allegiance. BUT, not all these groups were/are from God. Therefore, John encouraged his dear children to "test the spirits to see whether they are from God." We will study what John wrote and then apply it to our lives, giving us the true discernment necessary.

Sunday, June 15 Fathers' Day Luke 15:11-31 "A Father's Love"

We will examine this famous parable about the father and his two sons. However, we will consider the narrative from the perspectives of each brother and the attitude of the father. As we recognize all fathers and father figures on this day, we will learn the dynamics of a father's love at its core. With God's help, all of us who ARE fathers will strive to be more loving, and those who have or had a father can appreciate them more.

Sunday, June 22 Baptism Service Day 1 John 4:7-12 "God's Love on Display"

John used the word "love" 42 times in this epistle. Each time he used it, the Greek word Agape was chosen. The reason John chose this word for love is because it defines the love God has for us. God demonstrated His love for us by giving His only Son to die for our sins. We will study this passage and be reminded that when we love others with Agape love, God's love lives in us.

Sunday, June 29 New Members' Day 1 John 4:13-21 "God is Love"

In Math class, I learned the reflexive property, which stated "if a=b, then b=a." I used to be concerned with the phrase "God is love" for fear people might assume that "love is God." It is not. However, John used this phrase to portray God as the premier example of love. By studying this passage, we will learn how the sentence, "God is love" can shape our values, our passions, and our relationships.

Van Usage Guidelines

Many of you might be wondering if one can get access to the church van and, if so, how to go about doing that. Here are the steps to take for van usage.

First, the van will not be available to members of the community at large. Our insurance will not cover us if outside parties are using the van, independent of Salem Community Church.

There is a list of primary drivers (see below) who are authorized to drive the van. There is also a sheet for the driver to fill out and sign which will be kept on file in the church office.

Scheduling of the van must be completed with me, since the keys will be kept in the church office. The van can be picked up and returned to the church parking lot.

As long as the van is used locally, it will not need refueled upon return. I will see to the refueling of the van.

However, if the van is to be taken far away, and if the van should need gas to make it home, it will be the responsibility of the person who arranged for the use to the van to buy gas. That person should keep the gas receipt and submit it to the Church Treasurer Bill Burrier upon return for repayment.

Only the driver of record may drive on the event, in case a camera speed trap sends a speeding ticket. The church will not pay the speeding ticket fines. The driver will be responsible for any fines or penalties incurred.

The van will be reserved on a first come-first serve basis. $-Pastor\ Neil$
